## REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown

A vacated position resulting from a retirement was not funded for Fiscal Year 1994 (FY-94). The department staffing continues below standard levels for communities of this size in spite of continued growth in population and the increased demands on the department's resources.

A Computerized Police Records System went into operation during the year. The system automates the Police Department Records and significantly reduces the time spent by officers preparing the various forms required by the courts, Registry of Motor Vehicles, etc. when an arrest has been made. Computer Aided Dispatch, as part of the system, eliminates most redundancy between police and dispatch entries.

The Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) program at the Middle School has continued; being partially funded with grants acquired through the joint efforts of the school staff and this department.

Planning for Enhanced 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone Service for the Town has continued through the year. Minor modifications at the Police Station have been made to accommodate the new equipment. The service is expected to be initiated in the town in February of 1995.

Effective January 1, 1994 this department switched to a new method of reporting criminal activities to state and Federal agencies. The FBI has initiated a National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) which incorporates more extensive, detailed data collection. Massachusetts has been a pilot state in which NIBRS has been tested and evaluated and will soon be one of the first states to participate in the full-scale program.

Our automated records system is fully compatible with NIBRS and will permit us to be integrated into the proposed national law enforcement computer system called "NCIC 2000", which is being developed by the FBI.

Because of this transition the "Crimes Reported" figures in this and future reports cannot be validly compared to those of past years. Previously only the most serious crime related to an incident was reported, even if there were multiple crimes committed; now all the crimes committed are counted.

It is the responsibility of the Board of Cemetery Commissioners to make lots available for purchase by those who wish to own a family burial plot in Freetown. There are two town-owned cemeteries. They are the Assonet Burying Ground off South Main Street in the village of Assonet and the East Freetown Cemetery, a smaller area off Chace Road, on the south side, opposite Chace Cemetery.

There are several private cemeteries in both ends of the town, but the town officials are not involved with them unless they have Perpetual Care Funds deposited with the town and there is no one left to administer them.

The committee also oversees the expenditure of the interest from the Perpetual Care Funds of the two town cemeteries. The town cemeteries are mowed from Mother's Day in May through clean-up in November. Debris from winter storms is also removed in a timely fashion.

Many lots were purchased many years ago and have very small endowments. We encourage families using these lots to look into adding to the Perpetual Care on these family plots. ## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL ON AGING

Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

The Council on Aging offers various activities at the Multi-Purpose Senior Center for interested seniors. Among these are exercise classes, crafts, card games, and Bingo each week.

The Center is open Monday through Thursday from 10:00 A.M. to 2:30 P.M. with a member of the Council in attendance each day.

We have a Health Clinic once a month with a registered nurse in charge, and a podiatrist is available once a month for seniors.

A "Shine" counselor is available once a month to help any senior with Medicare bills and any other health insurance questions.

A Council on Aging Board Member, Mrs. Bagley, sends birthday and Christmas cards to seniors who have reached the age of 80. Also, a file of senior identification cards is kept at the Senior Center.

The Council on Aging supervises the Meals on Wheels program in Freetown and in parts of Berkley, and we will refer any needy seniors to the proper agency for help with fuel assistance, homemaking care, or health care.

A volunteer group from the East Freetown Senior Club gave the Center a much needed thorough cleaning, and this was greatly appreciated by the Council on Aging.

In 1993/1994, some of the services and activities of the C.O.A. were as follows: Two picnics were held at Dighton Rock State Park; a buffet lunch was served on August 12, 1993; Government surplus food was distributed; a foliage bus trip was held; a bus trip to the Foxwood Casino was held; 175 flu shots were given.

We held Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Luncheons for seniors, free of charge. Vision and hearing tests were given to any interested senior. Also, we had various speakers on estate planning, health insurance, and abatements.

Any Freetown senior having questions concerning activities or services of the Council on Aging are invited to call the Center at 763-9557.

Our chairman, Mr. Alfred V. Ferry, had major surgery early in 1994 and has been seriously ill. We are glad to report he is now much better.

Our Vice-Chairman, Mr. John Donahue, has also been very ill, but he, too, is on the road to recovery. We wish both of them a return to good health.

## REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the annual report of the Planning Board for the fiscal year July 1, 1993 through June 30, 1994.

During this fiscal year the Planning Board approved 6 Form A plans and 3 Form C plans thereby collecting \$6,590.13 in fees. The Board also collected engineering fees totaling \$3,745.00.

This year the Board has two active members on the By-law Comminee which enacted two new by-laws. The first by-law change concerned building and antenna heights and reads: "No buildings, antennas, water tanks, chimneys, towers, spires, and other structural features used for human occupancy or other purpose shall be erected that are in excess of fifty (50') feet in height. A projection erected that shall exceed the height shown above may be authorized by special permit providing the special permit granting authority finds the proposal is not contrary to the best public interest of the inhabitants of the Town of Freetown and is in accordance with Article XI. Section 5 - Board of



Appeals. In no case shall an antenna be erected on a lot that does not have a width and a length twice the height of the antenna."

The second new by-law change concerns setback requirements for single family and duplex structures and reads: "On preexisting non-conforming lots with less than 175 feet of frontage and 70,000 square feet of area, legally created and recorded prior to 09/22/86.

30 feet from street line

20 feet from other property lines

On lots with a minimum of 175 feet of frontage and 70,000 square feet of area legally created and recorded after 09/22/86.

50 feet from street line

20 feet from other property lines

Construction of new structures; additions, or expansions of existing structures within these setbacks will require a variance or special permit from the Board of Appeals."

Janet Nassr and Fred Cook are currently on the By-law Committee and are reviewing other by-laws which concern the citizens of Freetown.

The Planning Board is also working on establishing "Single Family Residential Protection Districts" within the town of Freetown and would welcome any suggestions the citizens of Freetown may have.

The Planning Board members are Chairman Robert Martin, Fred Cook, Janet Nassr, Joel Plissey, and Thomas Daley. The secretary is Laurie Carvalho.

### **REPORT TO THE TOWN OF FREETOWN FROM THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT**

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Freetown during 1994. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts.

During the past year, the Town of Freetown was represented on the SRPEDD Commission by Bruce Wilbur. The Joint Transportation Planning Group representative was Joseph Simmons.

Some of SRPEDD's more significant accomplishments in 1994 were:

Completion and certification of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities and made cities and towns eligible for federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects. The TIP sets priorities for \$315 million in federal and state dollars for regional transportation projects over the next 3 years.

SRPEDD developed the "Massasoit Compact", a collaborative economic strategy for the region. Over 50 organizations and individuals have signed the compact, pledging to do their share to revitalize the region's economy.

SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed 55 such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues. Nineteen (19) applications for federal

and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.

SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data throughout the region. SRPEDD continues to provide computerized accident filing for 9 towns and has provided pavement management assistance to 13 towns.

SRPEDD worked with both GATRA and SRTA on issues such as route evaluations, marketing, service to elderly and handicapped persons and overall data compilation and analysis.

Assistance to the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1994 SEED approved loans to 80 small businesses in the amount of \$7.2 million. These loans are projected to create 484 new jobs.

SRPEDD continued to operate the Southeastern Massachusetts Data Center, providing information to businesses, cities and towns, and individuals.

SRPEDD provided assistance to businesses on toxic materials use reduction. Staff worked with the Southeast Industrial Advisory Committee to hold meetings and workshops for businesses located throughout southeastern Massachusetts.

SRPEDD organized and co-sponsored the fifth annual Earth Lab Environmental Conference. The conference was held at Bridgewater State College for science teachers throughout the region.

With the traditional fishing industry in crisis, SRPEDD embarked on a program to develop aquaculture businesses in the region. Coastal and inland aquaculture have tremendous potential in southeastern Massachusetts.

SRPEDD conducted training and workshops for local officials on economic development, downtown revitalization, planning laws and community action statements.

In addition, municipal assistance was provided to Freetown in the following areas:

Economic Target Area application data (New Bedford)

Assonet Bay Shores waterline

### **REPORT OF THE JAMES WHITE MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

After many years of dedicated service our Custodian, Louis C. Ramsey retired. His cheerful assistance and love of children made his presence invaluable and welcome. He still checks in with us to see how we are getting on.

The second part of a very successful Summer Story Hour Program ran through July commandeered by Laurie Belanger. Puppets, tie-dyed shirts and other crafts made by the children gave much pleasure and enjoyment in their creation. We look forward to continuing, improving and extending such programs.

A top tier of shelving was added along the back wall to accommodate our burgeoning fiction collection. Large Print books were purchased. We also borrowed rotating collections of Large Print books and videos from Inter-Library Loan.



In January a gift of one hundred dollars in memory of Mrs. Florence West was received.

Statewide, we were included in a Tele-Fax/Computer Project from The Eastern Mass. Regional Library System which will allow us to access holdings at Boston Public Library. A secondary grant of \$1500 to help non-automated libraries to become members of automated networks will allow us to link with SEAL, the-Southeastern Automated Libraries. SEAL is composed of most libraries of our surrounding communities. We signed the Dial Access Agreement to become an affiliate member in June. These grants, on a one year trial basis, include both town libraries.

Many thanks to John's Auto Body, East Freetown for rustproofing and repainting our Book Return Box outside of the Library.

The Freetown Conservation is composed of seven volunteer, appointed members serving to protect the wetland areas within the Town. The Commission reviews, and if appropriate, approves plans for any work that is contemplated either in or within 100' of wetlands. This approval process is to ensure that all work conducted in or near a wetland resource area will not have a detrimental effect on the wetlands. Wetlands serve to provide storm and flood protection, pollution control and most importantly, a habitat for various species of plants and animals. With the increased understanding of how wetlands interact with the water table combined with the reliance of well water for drinking in Freetown, it is extremely important that citizens feel free to contact the Commission when they feel that a project may be endangering wetlands.

The Commission has a small amount of acreage deeded to it in the form of gifts to the Town. This ownership by the Commission ensures that the property is available for all to enjoy while simultaneously protecting any wetlands that may be on it.

My tenure as Superintendent for the Freetown and Lakeville School Departments is rapidly coming to a close. The following is my final report as your Superintendent of Schools.

As I complete my work the major question is; "Where are we in terms of instruction and curriculum, personnel and administration. This report tries to address the items listed above.

Together we have been able to meet the challenges and issues facing us these past five years. Townspeople, selectmen, school committee members, faculties and staff, students; all working together have successfully met the major challenges facing us. We have made significant strides in recovering from the devastation of budget cuts and uncertain direction.

The new education reform law is beginning to have a significant and positive impact on the quality of education offered in our local schools. This is critical as it is an unquestioned truth that the better educated the members of a society the higher standard is achieved by that society.

Our Special Education costs have been brought under control. Mr. Campia, our Director of Special Education has initiated a number of costs savings including implementing an inclusion model in our local schools. Two portable classrooms, on loan at no cost from the Lakeville School Department, were installed at the Middle School. Additional savings in excess of \$50,000 were realized as a result of the wiring and electrical services being donated.

End of the year reports, critical to securing our state funding, were completed promptly by Rose DiOrio our Business Manager, resulting in our monies being received from the state in a timely manner. We received over \$200,000 in emergency funding for our schools; allowing us to save vital teaching positions. We have improved in the area of personnel management by conducting a series of staff evaluation workshops for all Department Heads and building administrators. We have reinstated in-service days, as well as full curriculum days for teaching staff. All areas of curriculum, K thru 12, have been rewritten and up-dated. We received \$112,000 from the Tobacco and Health Grant. One result of this new legislation is that the use of tobacco products is now prohibited on school grounds and in school buildings.

Each school in Freetown and Lakeville now has a council comprised of parents, teachers, and members of the community at large. Each school has a Health and Safety Committee working to provide a safe and healthy environment.

After many studies, a major renovation project to the HVAC is underway at the George R. Austin Middle School. All of the duct work connected to the air handling units have been cleaned and sanitized. All of the air handling units have been cleaned and new types of filters have been installed. The HVAC system will be totally computerized so that better temperature and air quality can be monitored in each room. A new exhaust system has been integrated into the HVAC. A new unit in the pool area will control humidity and additional exhaust fans are being installed in the gym. The entire HVAC will be much more efficient as a result of these renovations.

As I conclude my tenure as your superintendent, I wish to express my appreciation for the trust and confidence you have placed in me.

## **FREETOWN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL 1993-1994**

Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Under the direction of the Superintendent of Schools, Freetown Elementary School has been the site of much activity during the 1993-1994 school year. The staff of the school has remained at the same complement as the previous year. However, we were successful in applying for a health protection grant that allowed Freetown Elementary School to increase the school nurse position from part-time to full-time. The grant also provided additional monies for health and nutrition education materials.

Staff has been involved with curriculum review and staff development training. This past year the staff piloted two whole language reading series that resulted in a recommendation to the superintendent and the school committee for adoption in the 1994-95 school year. The key has been to maintain staff involvement in the decision making process. The Principal's Advisory Council, composed of members representing the entire staff, has played an integral role in the process.

Teachers have been attending conferences and workshops on developmentally appropriate education. This past year, due to the Health Grant, PALMS Grant, and the D.D. Eisenhower Grant, staff members were encouraged to attend at least one conference that would enhance their teaching proficiency. We had eight staff members attend either Math Their Way or AIMS workshops during the 1994 summer recess period.

As part of the Education Reform Act of 1993, a School Council was organized at Freetown Elementary School comprising members from the staff, parents, and community. The purpose of the council is to assist and advise the principal in the overall direction of the school as well as develop a school improvement plan. The School Council presented their School Improvement Plan to the School Committee in June 1993 and a copy is on file in the school office.

This has been the fifth year that Freetown Elementary School has implemented an integrated model for our special needs students. Those students eligible for resource assistance receive the instruction in the classroom. During the past year, as has been the case since Freetown Elementary School adopted an integrated special needs model, several local school systems have been to Freetown Elementary School to review our program.

For the seventh year in a row, fourth grade teachers and students experienced an alternative outdoor education program by traveling with 112 students to Nature's Classroom at Prindle Pond Conference Center in Charlton, MA. This represented 85% of the fourth grade students. The students who participated in this outdoor experience found the week beneficial and returned to school with a renewed enthusiasm for learning.

Another aspect of our curriculum is the development of cultural programs. The P.T.O. has been instrumental in providing funds for these programs. This past year our students viewed "Johnny the K" in school as well as "Michael Cooper". Both of these performances presented excellent cultural arts programs funded through our P.T.O. Our hard working P.T.O. also sponsored a Book Fair, Holiday Fair, Books and Beyond Reading Incentive Program, a third grade trip to the Zeiterion Theatre, and a second grade trip to the World Trade Center. Our first grade visited Roger Williams Park and the Zeiterion Theatre. These are but a few of the activities supported by our P.T.O.

Officer Sullivan, from the Freetown Police Department, has continued to come to the Freetown Elementary School and teach safety lessons to our students. Topics include

School Bus Safety, Seat Belt and Winter Safety, Drugs and Alcohol, Personal Safety, Crime Prevention and Bicycle Safety. These programs are extremely beneficial to our students.

Our Chapter I budget was \$43,639. The Chapter I Program serviced 38 children in grades 1-3. A grade breakdown of the students indicated that 19 first graders and 19 second and third grade students were served. The Chapter 1 evaluator reported that student gains ranged from 5.6 to 12.5 NCE's with the greatest gain of 12.5 by second grade students. The students were only serviced in reading during the 93-94 school year.

Again, as in past years, our Holiday and Spring Concerts, under the direction of Mrs. Correia, were outstanding. The music curriculum has adopted the ORFF-Schulwerk experimental approach. Music, movement, song, speech, and instrument playing are integrated in the music classes. The Physical Education Program under the direction of Mr. Dias, focuses on skill development, related non-competitive games and movement experiences at the primary level (K,1,2). In our third and fourth grade program we teach the basic fundamentals that lead toward team sports, i.e. soccer, basketball, and volleyball. Mrs. Sylvia has enhanced our skill based Art Program by introducing an art appreciation program to encourage children in creating visual art and to aid in developing their sensory perception and awareness. The school also sponsored an Art Fair in late May. Every student at Freetown Elementary School had an art exhibit on display.

The Volunteers at Freetown Elementary (V.A.F.E.) completed their fourth successful year. Twenty-four teachers and the school nurse used over 110 parent volunteers during the past school year. For the fourth consecutive year, our school library was staffed and run completely by parent volunteers. Each class received a 40 minute library period each week. The V.A.F.E. Program is coordinated by Mrs. Rhonda Sylvia-Alves, a parent volunteer.

In looking at the daily operation of our school, there are many things that happen that are taken for granted, such as the cleanliness of our school provided by our custodians, the individual health needs of our students, provided by our School Nurse, the many answers to questions, provided by our school secretaries, and the cooperation of our parents.

In conclusion, the success of our school is due to our hard working staff and the cooperation that we have received from the community at large, the elected officials, and especially the Superintendent and the School Committee.
