REPORT OF THE TOWN CLERK

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown: The following is a report of the Town Clerk's Department for the fiscal year July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013.

TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE:

- <u>Records Management</u> Last year we began the task of microfilming the historical records maintained in the Town Clerk's Office. The process has continued this year along with binding the records for preservation. We also obtained a database to coordinate the Town Clerk's Office records retention schedule to be in compliance as required by the MA Public Records law.
- <u>VIP (Virtual Information Partnership) Birth, Death and Marriage Modules-</u> The procedure for recording births has changed within the state. After many trainings provided by the Registry of Vital Records and Statistics MA Dept. of Public Health, MA municipalities and hospitals began posting all new birth data online with the Registry of Vital Records. The Death Module, in the recording of burial permits and death certificates is scheduled to become active in 2014. In 2015, the Marriage Module, with the recording of marriage intentions and marriage licenses will follow.
- <u>State computers and printers-</u> The state computers and printers in the Town/City Clerks and Election Division Offices throughout the state were replaced by the Secretary of the State in all 351 MA communities. These computers and printers are used for the purpose of maintaining census, voter information and election data.

ELECTIONS:

• <u>District Changes</u> – Based on the Federal 2010 census the district lines have changed in Freetown and the town changed from having 3 State Representative to having 2 State Representatives.

Old Districts- Precinct1 was in District 6 (Rep. David Sullivan), Precinct 2 was in District 9 (Rep. Christopher Markey) and Precinct 3 was in District 12 (Rep. Keiko Orrall).

New Districts- Precinct 1 stays in District 6 (Rep. David Sullivan) and Precinct 2 and Precinct 3 are now in District 8 (Rep. Paul A. Schmid III).

- <u>State Primary and Recount</u>- On September 6, 2012 there was 12% turnout in the Primary and a Recount of the Democratic Councillor, 1st District position was held on September 14, 2012.
- <u>Special Prop 2 ½ Town Election</u>- There was a Prop 2 ½ election that was held on September 24, 2012 to pay Freetown's share of the bond to pay for the costs of updating technology infrastructure and related incidentals for the Freetown/Lakeville Regional School District. The question was accepted with an 11% voter turnout.
- <u>Presidential Election</u> The town had an 83% voter turnout for Presidential election held on November 6, 2012 with 3 questions on the ballot and an additional non-binding question on the ballot for Precinct 1.

- <u>Annual Town Election</u>- The Board of Selectmen race was the only contested position on the ballot. There was a 17% voter turnout on the election that was held on April 1, 2013.
- <u>Special State Primary</u>- A Special State Primary was held on April 30, 2013 to fill the vacancy left by Senator John Kerry who accepted a position in Washington as the Secretary of State. There was an 11% voter turnout.
- <u>Special State Election</u>- On June 25, 2013 the Special State Election was held to vote in the new Senator. There was a 26% voter turnout.

Within the last 2 fiscal years, the town has been very busy with 9 elections (3 last fiscal year, 6 this fiscal year) and I would therefore, on behalf of the town residents, like to extend our gratitude to the Election Workers, Wardens, Clerks and the Board of Registrars for their dedication and all their hard work during the election periods.

In addition, the Assistant Town Clerk, Diane Souza is an integral part of the election process as well as performing the tasks that need to be completed on a daily basis in the Town Clerk's Office. I would like to extend my endless thanks to her for all her assistance.

REPORT OF THE FREETOWN FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Honorable board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Freetown:

The following is the annual report of the Finance Committee for Fiscal year July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

The Finance Committee is the budgetary watchdog of the town. Finance committees were established so a representative group of taxpayers could conduct a thorough review of municipal finance questions on behalf of all citizens.

The Finance Committee is primarily responsible for submitting its recommendations on the annual budget the Town Meeting. The committee is usually involved in budget preparation which involves the establishment of budgetary guidelines for department heads. This task has been accomplished in coordination with the Board of Selectmen. Please note, the Board of Selectmen set fiscal policy voted upon at the Town Meeting. The Finance Committee makes recommendations only to the Board and at the Town Meetings.

The Reserve Fund exists to fund extraordinary and unforeseen expenses. It is disbursed through transfers approved by the Finance Committee. The Board of Selectmen review reserve requests. The Finance Committee is not obligated to accept the Board's recommendation, although we are usually in agreement. Your Finance Committee has been rigorous in monitoring the proper use of these funds. We have required departments to utilize all funds budgeted before any disbursements are made from the reserve account. We have asked departments to seek Finance Committee approval before expenditures and subsequently seeking reserve funds in non emergency situations. The Finance Committee was allocated \$125,000.00 for the reserve account for the past fiscal year.

The following is the Annual Report of the Freetown Police Department for Fiscal Year July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013:

Mission Statement

The Freetown Police Department is committed to providing the highest level of public safety and service to the citizens and business people within the community. The members of the Department are empowered to enforce the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the bylaws of the Town of Freetown to ensure that the peace and tranquility of our community is maintained and that crime and the fear of crime are reduced.

Core Values

The following values guide our work:

Integrity – We adhere to the highest moral and ethical standards. We are honest and sincere in dealing with each other and the community. We have the courage to uphold these principles and are proud that they guide us in all we do.

Respect – We recognize the value of individuality and treat all people with dignity. We cherish, defend and protect the rights, liberties and freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution.

Fairness – We are consistent in our treatment of all persons. Our actions are tempered with reason, equity, and governed by law.

Personnel Transitions

Ms. Christiansen retired after approximately 33 years of service. She was appointed as a parttime Signal Operator during 1980, full-time Signal Operator during 1986, and Dispatch Supervisor during 1998. Ms. Christiansen's career included serving as a Reserve Police Officer and the department's Criminal Justice Information System representative. We take this opportunity to thank her for her service, dedication, and commitment.

<u>Grants</u>

The Department was successful in obtaining state 9-1-1 Department grant monies. These monies were used for the training dispatch personnel, acquisition of dispatch furniture, and the installation of a computer server used to maintain records.

Facility

The existing police facility is inadequate for the safety, security and equipment needs of a department our size and the demands placed upon it.

Regional Collaboration

The Department is a member of the Southeastern Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council (SEMLEC) and has access to important resources, including search and rescue, canine, rapid response, tactical, marine, and dive team units. SEMLEC consists of 29 area police departments sharing knowledge, personnel and equipment.

Firearm Licensing

The Department processed 283 License to Carry (LTC) and Firearm Identification Card (FID) applications, including original and renewals.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Freetown:

The following is the Annual Town Report of the Freetown Fire Department for the fiscal year of July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013

The Freetown Fire Department responded to 1,774 calls for service during the last fiscal year, which is represented as follows:

There are two retirements to report. Lieutenant Wesley Vaughan Jr. retired after 32 years of service. Wes was a dedicated professional and one of the hardest working firefighters I have ever known. Wes was instrumental in bringing paramedic service to the Town of Freetown and was the Town's first Fulltime Firefighter / Paramedic. He was a mentor to all those who followed and his retirement has left a hole in the department that will be difficult to fill. Dispatcher Supervisor Brenda Christiansen "signed-off" after 32 years of service. Brenda was the best of the best and she quietly saved lives, comforted victims, urged safety and provided support for police and firefighters every time she stood watch. On behalf of all Fire Department members, I say it's been a pleasure and thank both of you for your years of service.

The Fire Department was awarded four grants during the past fiscal year. In January, a Federal Assistance to Firefighters Operations and Safety Grant in the amount of \$26,524.00 was awarded to the fire department to purchase and equip each firefighter with protective forestry gear.

The department also received a Public Safety 'SAFE' Grant in the amount of \$4,625.00, a DCR grant in the amount of \$644.44 and a Mass Call/Volunteer Firefighters Association Fire Company of the Month Grant in the amount of \$500.00. The SAFE Grant is used to train and equip firefighters to be public fire education instructors and conduct fire safety classes throughout town. The MCVFA Grant was used to purchase tires for Brush Breaker 2. The grant from the Department of Conservation and Recreation "Volunteer Fire Assistance" Grant Program was used to purchase new chainsaws for the department's brush breakers.

Call Firefighters Nathan Gagnier and Kyle Grenier, successfully completed Massachusetts Firefighting Academy Call/Volunteer Firefighter Training Class # 043 to become trained to the NFPA 1001 Firefighter I/II standard. This training consists of over two hundred hours of classroom and hands on training and testing through academic exams and practical skill applications. This program is time and labor intensive and speaks volumes of the dedication and commitment to serving the town by these firefighters.

Firefighters performed 261 in-service inspections and issued 177 permits during the past fiscal year. These inspections included schools, churches, daycare centers and commercial properties as

well as smoke and carbon monoxide inspections for new and resale homes. Firefighters are also responsible for station cleaning, hose testing, and equipment and vehicle maintenance. Fire department members have attended a combined 3,062 hours of fire training both in-house and at Massachusetts Firefighting Academy sponsored programs.

Last fiscal year, 891 open-air burning (brush) permits were issued. Burning season begins January 15th and runs through May 1st (weather permitting). Burning permits are available on-line or can be obtained in person at the Bullock Road Fire Station (Sta.3) beginning January 1st each year. Burning hours are between 10AM and 4PM, but residents must notify the fire department either by logging in on-line or by calling the Fire Station each day before they burn to confirm that burning is allowed that day.

On July 22, the department took delivery of a new 2012 Ford F-550 Forestry Unit to replace the 1968 Jeep Forestry Unit. This new vehicle will be housed at Station 1 and was paid for with a federal Assistance to Firefighters Grant.

On May 31, the department took delivery of a new 2014 KME Panther Custom Pumper to replace the 1986 Ford as the town's primary pumping appliance at Fire Station #3. The 1986 Ford will be kept in reserve at Station 2 and the 1973 International Foam Unit was removed from service and disposed of.

The Fire Department radio system is currently operating at a substandard level especially in the area of the Assonet "four corners" and all points south. There is a lack of effective radio communications both on the fire ground, and between the incident commander and the communications center. Poor communications also impacts our ability to "call out" firefighters living in certain areas of the "village", as many of them cannot hear calls being dispatched over the radio due to poor radio reception. Options are being explored to address issues with the current emergency radio communications system.

In closing, I would be remiss if I didn't mention our unsung heroes, the Freetown Communications Center Personnel. Their work goes most unnoticed but they are the voice in the darkness that gives hope to those who really need it.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the report of the Highway Department for the fiscal year July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013.

Using Chapter 90 funds, the following projects were completed: Route 79 (Mill Street and Richmond Road) was resurfaced with a 20% rubberized asphalt chip seal; Chipaway Road, Pleasant Street, Quanapoag Road, and other roads were crack sealed; a sinkhole on Buena Vista Avenue was excavated and filled and the road was resurfaced; and new guardrails were installed on Friend Street and Slab Bridge Road.

Other road repairs were carried out as follows: Asphalt was laid on Beach Street, Chipaway Road, and Friend Street; catch basins were repaired on Dean Street; and grindings were placed on Copicut Road, Lang Road, and Point of Pines Road. Throughout the town, roads were swept, catch basins were cleaned, berms were built, and other minor repairs were carried out as needed.

The Highway Department was on duty during Hurricane Sandy in October and the Blizzard of 2013 in February. In both storms, men from this department assisted the Tree Warden in carrying out his duties throughout the town, as did men from the Fire Department during the blizzard.

The town took delivery of the following vehicles and equipment this year: A 2004 Ford F750 truck equipped for cleaning catch basins and a 2012 Elgin Pelican street sweeper. Also, a 2012 Morbark Beever wood chipper was purchased with Chapter 90 funds to replace the 1972 Mitts & Merrill wood chipper which no longer meets safety standards.

The salt shed was outfitted with a tank for storing liquid calcium, and this method of deicing was tested during the winter to gauge its effectiveness in treating the roads prior to the normal sanding and salting.

The Highway Department assisted with setting up for the Independence Day parade and fireworks, all elections, the Robinson Estates Yard Sale, the Historical Society Open House, the Town Christmas Tree, Lakeside Festival, and the Strawberry Festival. In addition, all routine tasks were performed such as snowplowing, sanding, sweeping roads, the mowing of the Assonet Burying Ground, boat ramp, libraries, town parks, roadsides, ball fields, and the transfer station; replacing signs, painting signs, and the general maintenance of the town and its equipment.

The Freetown Water Commission is responsible for providing quality drinking water to over 594 customers in both Assonet and East Freetown. We have approximately 17 miles of water supply lines, a booster pump station located on East Chipaway Road and a canister filtration facility located on South Main Street. The Freetown Water Commission purchases water from both Fall River and New Bedford which makes us a Consecutive Water System. We are required by the Department of Environmental Protection to perform periodic testing to ensure that our water meets all local, state and federal drinking water standards. Our annual Drinking Water Quality Report is available at the Water Commission office located at 3 North Main Street, Assonet.

The Freetown Water Commission operates using an Enterprise Fund budget which allows us to operate with only the monies collected through fees and water usage charges. We do not utilize any general fund or tax dollars to operate.

The Water Commission contracts WhiteWater Inc. as their licensed operators as required for a water system our size. Other employees include;

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMISSION

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the report of the Cemetery Commission for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013.

Assonet Burying Ground

This was the second fiscal year, and the first full fiscal year, during which the Highway Department had charge of the regular maintenance of the cemetery. Aside from all routine mowings, that department also cleared trees from the west property line, the area around the shed, and atop the tomb. We have received many compliments in the last two years on the improved condition and appearance of the cemetery. As grateful as we are to receive this praise, please also thank Chuck Macomber and the employees of the Highway Department when you see them.

After surveying and laying out the remainder of Section 35 and the new Section 36, we established in both sections an area reserved for veterans. This area will be subject to special restrictions that will give it the uniform appearance typical of the state and national cemeteries such as those in Agawam and Bourne, creating almost a veterans cemetery within the cemetery. It is our hope that this area will appeal to those who may wish to be buried in a veterans cemetery but feel that the full-fledged veterans cemeteries are too distant or inconvenient for family.

A generous donation of flag holders for the graves of Freetown firemen was received from the Freetown Firefighters Association. We will continue to work with the Association to locate and mark these graves, both in the Assonet Burying Ground and in other cemeteries throughout town. Also to be thanked is Richard Brown, who continues to volunteer his expertise and a very great deal of his time on a variety of projects.

Other Public Cemeteries

Late in the summer, the Tisdale Burying Ground was cleared of brush and overgrowth through the work of Heath Chace and Brandon DeMoranville, and a new path was cut from the Porter's Shore lane to the cemetery. We will continue to fight back the rebirth of brush and weeds here and at the two cemeteries at Braley's Station that were cleared out last year. With luck, their past neglect will soon be a distant memory.

Repairs to the fence at Richmond Cemetery were carried out in June by Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical High School under the direction of welding instructor Doug Desrochers. At the close of the year, plans were underway to have students in the 2013-14 school year repair the fencing on older lots in the Assonet Burying Ground. We are quite pleased to be able to accomplish this work and also provide valuable field experience to the students from Old Colony.

We were pleased to see the first lot sold in the East Freetown Cemetery in several decades, and we continued to look after the Haskins, Mother's Brook, Old Quaker, and Richmond cemeteries.

Interments

There were fourteen interments in the Assonet Burying Ground during the fiscal year, formerly residing as follows: Assonet (6), Carver (1), Middleborough (1), Taunton (2), Weymouth (1); Danielson, Conn. (1); Melbourne, Fla. (1); and Powder Springs, Ga. (1). Five were men and nine were women. Five were cremated. The youngest person interred was 31, and the eldest was 92. Three were veterans, two of the Korean War and one of the Vietnam War. There were no burials recorded in any other town-owned cemeteries this year.

Private Cemeteries & Perpetual Care

There are eight private cemeteries for which the Town is custodian of some or all perpetual care funds, namely the Chace, Evans, Friends, Morton, Nichols, Rounsevell, White, and Winslow cemeteries. Presently, the town arranges for maintenance services at the Evans, Morton, Nichols, and Winslow cemeteries at their expense, while the Chace, Friends, Rounsevell, and White cemeteries make their own arrangements.

A fundraiser was held in October and November at Grandpa's Place on South Main Street to benefit abandoned and neglected cemeteries throughout the town. Patrons could choose to donate \$1.00 toward these efforts in exchange for displaying their name on a paper headstone. We thank owners Tom & Liz Borges for allowing us to do this.

Restoration of the Plummer Burial Ground continued in earnest. Two dead spruce trees near to the road were removed through the cooperation of N-Star, and Roger Guimond continued to remove trees in other areas of the property. During the spring, Heath Chace and Dennis DeMoranville hauled away brush and debris and began trimming new growth. We are grateful that the community's response to the cleanup of this cemetery has been quite positive.

Volunteer maintenance and other projects were carried out in other cemeteries this year as follows: Trees were removed as needed from the Friends and Nichols cemeteries by Dan Reis; fencing was installed around the Haskins/Prout Graves by Cape Cod Aggregates; and the Crystal Springs School resumed caring for the Guilford Evans Burial Ground. Those wishing to restore or maintain an abandoned cemetery are asked to contact the Cemetery Commission in advance for permission and guidance.

Veterans' Graves

On Saturday, May 18th, a cadre of volunteers under the direction of our Veterans' Graves Officer, Dan LeBlanc, placed flags on the graves of veterans throughout town. All known veterans' graves are marked with flags prior to Memorial Day each year. This yearly tradition is a way of remembering the sacrifices made by the hundreds of soldiers and sailors buried in town. If you are aware of a veteran's grave which is not being marked, or have questions regarding veterans' benefits, please contact either Mr. LeBlanc or a member of the Cemetery Commission.

Also during this fiscal year, we applied to the VA to replace seven illegible and weatherworn headstones in the Assonet Burying Ground marking the graves of Civil War veterans. These headstones, replaced at government expense, were for John Q. Adams, Clement C. Cannon, William R. Dean, Abram Haskell, Abram H. Haskell, James H. Haskell, and Thomas Westgate. We will continue to assess government stones and apply for replacements as the need arises.

Fee Schedule & Gravediggers

Our fees remained the same as in the previous year, and we continue to offer a discount for veterans purchasing graves. Anyone wishing to purchase a lot, or to add to a cemetery's perpetual care endowment, is asked to contact a member of the Cemetery Commission, and we will be happy to oblige.

As of January 1, 2011, a license is required of any person who wishes to dig graves in the town's public cemeteries. The fee for obtaining a license was set at \$1.00 per year, with licenses issued for five years at a time (or, \$5.00 each time a license is issued or renewed). Currently, the following are so licensed:

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

The 2012 Town Census showed us that the senior population has grown 25% (2193 seniors) over the last two years in the town of Freetown.

It has been a challenging year for the staff and volunteers at the Council on Aging. Many of our long time devoted senior volunteers have stepped down for various health reasons and are greatly missed. Some of the programs and projects at the COA rely on our volunteers to keep them going and new volunteers are trying to help fill those hours to keep our programs in place. The Senior Center is deeply dependent on volunteer hours to satisfy the needs of our senior community.

Programs offered this past year include Are You OK? Program, Blood Pressure Screening, Flu Clinic, Podiatry Clinic, Exercise Classes, Computer Classes, Bingo, Seated Massage, Card Games, Pitch, Painting Classes, Line Dancing, Walking Club, Meals on Wheels Program, Legal Referrals, Legislative hours, Medical Equipment loaner program, Pool Table, Handicap Van Transportation, SHINE (Serving the Health Information Needs of Elders) Monday morning muffins and coffee (winter), Monday afternoons Sundaes (summer), Kanakis Produce Truck, Birthday Parties, Fuel Assistance applications, SNAP Applications (Food Stamps), Income Tax Prepared by the AARP, Referral Services, Catered Luncheons, Brown Bag Program (161 eligible participants), Senior Club, Day Trips, Overnight Trips and Volunteers opportunities.

Stop and Shop Warehouse and the Tuesday Club donate monthly of non-perishable food products, cleaning supplies and personal care items. We currently serve 126 eligible families. Anyone from town receiving state assistance is welcome to come and inquire about this program.

A Formula Grant is written every year to help pay for utilities for the building and mailings of our monthly newsletter. The newsletter has important information about upcoming events and activities. Other town departments and organizations are encouraged to submit any events they would like published in the monthly newsletter.

Keeping up with technology and social media we now have a Face Book page where information and photos are shared.

Grants are written for individual seniors to fix their homes for health and safety. Through the USDA Rural Development qualified seniors can receive up to \$7500.00 (Seven thousand five hundred dollars) to fix their home. This grant does not have to be paid back as long as the senior remains in the home for 3 years after. Some examples are deck repair, new door, heating systems, railings, steps, roof work and new windows.

Veterans Agent Dan LeBlanc is available for our Veterans or their spouses by appointment -Monday through Friday from 9AM-4PM. Free luncheons were held for seniors by Crystal Springs in Assonet. Reverend Dias from the Calvary Pentecostal Church gave a Thanksgiving luncheon and a Spring Luncheon. A luncheon was held at the Freetown VFW sponsored by our Legislative Representatives. Stop and Shop Warehouse gave two cookouts for the seniors; they supplied all the food, paper products and volunteers.

Thanks to the Freetown VFW for allowing the Council on Aging to use their hall for luncheons and weekly line dancing lessons. Also, a Big thank you to the Freetown Police Association for all their contributions to our needy families.

REPORT OF THE VETERANS' SERVICES DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

The following is the Report of the Office of Veterans' Services for Fiscal Year July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

This past Fiscal Year has seen yet again an unprecedented increase in the number of clients served by this office both in providing Massachusetts General Law (M.G.L.) Chapter 115 benefits and Federal Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) program applications. Over this past year we have provided financial assistance to 23 clients/ families. This is an increase from FY 2012 where we served 16 clients and in FY 2011 6 clients. The State average for communities with populations between 3,870 and 13,870 in FY 2012 was 8 cases we almost tripled the State average.

We provided financial assistance this past year to these clients in the amount of \$121,353.54 compared to \$87,358.00 in FY 2012. All benefits that were provided in FY 2013 were audited by both the Town Auditor and the Massachusetts Department of Veterans' Services which did not report any discrepancies in FY 2013. Effective October 1, 2012 we have had a full 75% reimbursement of expenses incurred since that date in the amount of \$81,730.00 which will be issued to the Town in the next Fiscal Year. Sixteen other applicants for Chapter 115 assistance were denied benefits with no appeals.

Over this past year we have received over 150 telephone and personal contacts. Many of these were questions or inquiries regarding Veteran status, obtaining Veteran Discharges (DD214/553), requests for Medals/Ribbons, Department of Veterans' Affairs eligibility for Health Care, burial benefit questions as well as entitlement to both State benefits regarding matters such as the State Annuity and Bonus programs. Federal and State Educational programs and questions regarding the newly instituted Veteran driver's license initiative through the Registry of Motor vehicles.

Assistance was provided to 22 veterans' and widows with claims against the DVA for Compensation/Pension and Health Care benefits. Seven claims still remain pending while six claims were resolved and provided over \$60,000.00 in retroactive Federal benefits to six clients. I have also reached out by letter to four veterans who have recently returned home to Freetown from active duty introducing myself and offering any assistance they feel necessary.

My commitment to the Town as a member of the Freetown Memorial Park Committee continues. Work will continue by this very small committee until the completion when the dedication will occur. We wish to extend our sincere thanks to Mr. Ralph Gurney for his dedication to the Park and wish him a speedy return.

Since the Cemetery Commission established a Veteran Section at the Town owned Assonet Burial Grounds. We have assisted in obtaining two Veteran headstone's in this beautiful new section. Also, with the outstanding assistance and cooperation of the Cemetery Commission and the Historical Society research we have now replaced eight Civil War headstones that were weather worn and no longer legible. With their cooperation and that of the Cemetery Department of the Department of Veterans' Affairs in Quantico, Virginia these eight headstones were replaced with beautiful new stones at no cost to the Town. Installation was completed by the Highway Department.

We are also working with Mr. Michael McCue and the Cemetery Commission to identify and rehab other cemeteries in Town where veterans' may be buried as well.

Last year we flagged over 650 graves at 14 cemeteries in East Freetown and Assonet replacing old worn flags with new flags and providing new veteran flag holders where necessary. The cost for these flags last year was \$442.88 75% of this cost is reimbursed by the State DVS. All other flags purchased are our responsibility last year we expended at total of \$2,200.00 on flags and wreaths for Memorial Day and the Fourth of July. I wish also, to personally thank the members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Freetown Memorial, Post 6643 and the Assonet American Legion, Post 0425 and the parents and members of Boy Scout Troops in Assonet and East Freetown who assisted in the Memorial Day flagging of the veteran graves. Without their help every year this would not be possible.

The recently installed Round-A-Bout in East Freetown at the intersection of County, Mason and Chace Roads which is adjacent to the previously renovated Town Veterans' Square was dedicated in the spring of 2013 to the memory of United States Navy, CPO2 Tyler J. Trahan who was killed in action in Iraq on April 30, 2009, I was privileged to be asked by the Town and the Trahan family to be the Master of Ceremonies for this ceremony which was attended by over 500 individuals including numerous veterans organizations the US Navy Band the Lt. Governor, Deputy Secretary of Veterans' Services and numerous other dignitaries.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve Freetown and will continue my commitment to the Veterans of this community as long as the Town requires. I personally look forward to serving the residents of the Town of Freetown for many years to come. Please check the Freetown website for contact information or call for me at Town Hall.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Freetown:

The following is the report of the Library department for the period July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

<u>Library Trustees:</u> This years' Board consisted of Irene Ashley (Chair); Lucille M. Rosa (Vicechair), Lori Weider (Resigned March 2013), Richard Spencer, Michael McCue(Secretary), Casey Pittsley(resigned January 2013), Vincent Kyne, and Christine Paiva

<u>Children's Programs</u>: This year we offered a weekly story hour. We did not have many children attending the story hour, eventually we decided to suspend story hour. The story hours that we did have, stories were read to the children followed by a craft lesson. This program was held on Thursdays at 10:00 am. We would like to thank Cynthia Souza for volunteering her time to once again make this program possible. Parents that did expressed an interest in attending a story hour with their child; their children were under the age of two. Children that are under the age of two often have difficulties participating in structure activities. Some parents tried to get their child involved, but it proved to be very difficult at best.

There was an Earth Day Program held at the James White Library. This program was sponsored by the Friends of the Freetown Libraries. The children that attended were given seedlings to plant at home and they also helped with the leave clean-up around the outside of the library. This program was to teach the children the importance of our environment.

There was an "Interactive Music Program" offered to all ages, this program was presented by Roger Tincknell. Mr. Tincknell performs in many libraries in Massachusetts. Over forty people attended, both children and parents.

There was an "Internet Danger/Security Program offered to Adults, we had a very small turn out for this program

This year, like all of the previous years, we were able to supplement the summer reading lists that were provided to us by the surrounding schools. These books are always in high demand because many schools require their students to read the same titles as our schools in the network.

Library visits, internet use, and resource sharing all slightly decreased in FY13. According to Deborah Conrad, Executive Director of SAILS Library Network, there was on overall circulation decreased by 4.5% in FY13 of all libraries in the SAILS network. Circulation for FY 13 was 19,232. Overdrive download of audio book was 209, overdrive of eBooks was 684, we loaned 6,709 pieces of materials to other libraries in the SAILS Network, and we borrowed 6,562 pieces of materials from other libraries in the SAILS Network. We borrowed 92 pieces of materials from library outside of the network and loaned 26 pieces of materials from libraries out of the network. All of this would not have been possible if we were not certified by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners

We received approximately \$7,200.00 in State Aide. If a library does not meet the amount of town appropriations set by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners, they are in danger of losing their State Aide. FY13 I am proud to say that our town met the required budget set forth by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners. This year, was the first in sometime that we were not in danger of losing our Certification.

In FY13, the budget was spent on salaries, books, audio books, magazines, DVDs, compact discs, e-books, newspapers, park and museum passes, network membership, software, hardware, large print books, children's books, electricity, phone, heat, building maintenance, etc. The library spent \$31,418 on library materials, keeping our libraries up to date with current materials and filling the requests of our patrons.

June 30, 2013, Cheryl Belliveau retired as Library Technician. She had held that position for twenty-four years. She gave much dedication to the residents of East Freetown and Assonet. Her friendly personality and inviting ways are going to be greatly missed. In April, we hired Casey Pittsley to fill the position that Mrs. Belliveau was vacating. Mrs. Belliveau was able to provide Ms. Pittsley with extensive training so that the transition would be seems. Mrs. Belliveau will be missed by many. We are glad to welcome Ms. Pittsley as a member of the Freetown Library Staff.

<u>Buildings/Grounds</u>: We would like to thank the Building Commissioner Paul Bourgeois for the maintenance that he provides at the Hathaway Library in Assonet and the White Library in East Freetown. The White Library is privately owned and overseen by the Building Trustees. Due limited funds and lack of volunteers, they were unable to keep up the grounds at the White Library this year. The Freetown Highway Department and Paul Bourgeois team stepped forward and helped out greatly buy taking care of the grounds. We would like to thank Chuck Macomber and his crew for their help. We also wish to thank the members of the East Freetown Congregational Christian Church, who generously allow us to use their parking lot and who plowed the lot throughout the winter.

Senior Librarian Althea Brady uses her knowledge of reference, the community, and circulation services for the benefit of our library patrons. Her dedication to both The Hathaway and The White Library does not go unnoticed or unappreciated. She is also a very active member of the Friends of the Library, putting in many volunteer hours to organize and work at the semi-annual book sales as well as any other project/program to support the library. Cheryl Belliveau/Casey Pittsley constitutes our entire Technical Services staff and they have all of the responsibility for cataloging our library materials, at times this is an overwhelming task but they are always able to get everything accomplished. Mary Ouimet has been with us for a number of years through the Senior Volunteer Program. Mary Ouimet is an asset to the library. She has been willing to fill in when we are shorthanded, which is often. She goes above and beyond of what is expected from her. We unofficially consider Mrs. Ouimet a member of our staff. Every staff member has to be willing to multi-task and be knowledgeable about library services, automated circulation, interlibrary loan, and delivery procedures. They must also be willing to be flexible with the hours that they are needed to work. It is impossible to enumerate all of the things that these dedicated, talented women do for the library, but we do know that they are appreciated by the Trustees and by the residents of Freetown and by the Library Director.

REPORT OF THE FREETOWN HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the report of the Historical Commission for the period July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013. The Freetown Historical Commission, the town appointed board continues works to protect and preserve historic structures and landmarks.

The FHC has continued efforts to preserve and rehabilitation the Assonet Village School circa 1794. The FHC was awarded a Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund Emergency Grant in the amount of \$30,000.00 by Secretary of State William F. Galvin's office towards emergency repairs to the Village School. At the June 2011 Annual Town Meeting, residents approved matching funds of \$30,000.00 to fund the repairs for the Village School. The FHC's goals were to replace the leaking roof, replace the front stairs and make the building water tight so that no further destruction would take place. Following the guidelines if the MPPF Grant, the FHC requested bids from 5 architects who were on the MHC approved list. Interviews were conducted, as well as site visits and references were contacted. Mr. Charles VanVoorhis of New Bedford was our selected choice. Mr.VanVoorhis with professional assistance conducted a full assessment of the Village School. The Village School was last used as a school in 1950 and for the next 40 plus years it was used for committee meetings, and Civil Defense. It has been vacant and neglected for many years. The long range goals are to rehab the structure so it can be utilized by the town. Mr. VanVoorhis initiated a Structural Assessment by Boston Structural Consulting Engineers and an asbestos evaluation was conducted. Recommendations from these assessments included reconstruction for part of the foundation and the roof with new trusses. The M & C Contracting of North Attleboro was the lowest bid. However, all contracts exceeded the funds that were procured. The FHC met with the Finance Board and Selectmen and an article was submitted to request additional funding from the town to proceed with the project. At the June 2013, the town of Freetown approved \$120,000 to make the necessary repairs and reconstruction of the foundation, roof rafters, new roof, and new stairway. The FHC greatly appreciates the support of the Selectmen, Finance Board and the community so that this project can proceed. One of the conditions of the grant was that a large red sign be placed in front of the Village School House that stated "Preservation Works"- listing the Town of Freetown, Freetown Historical Commission, Charles VanVoorhis, Architect and M & C Co Contractor. Erecting the sign helped to create quite a bit of interest and support for the project which was scheduled to begin in July 2013. Meetings with Charles VanVoorhis, the FHC, Mike Mello of M&C Contracting, and the preservationist from MHC ensured good communication coordination. We are excited and appreciative to be able to have this opportunity to begin this goal for the repairs and restoration of the School House.

<u>Historic Bridges</u>: Restoration and Rehabilitation of the Gurney Road, Forge Road, and Narrows Road Culvert were completed. The FHC was involved with the Gurney Road and Forge Road Bridges as members photographed and recorded the process on a CD to become part of our town's history and archives.

<u>Demolition Delay By Law</u>: There were no requests for demolition of 100 year old structures brought before FHC.

We presently have an opening for membership on our commission. Interested candidates are asked to submit a letter to the Freetown Historical Commission and Freetown Board of Selectmen. Meetings are usually held on the second Thursday of the month, except when noted as posted in the Town Hall. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF THE FREETOWN PLANNING BOARD

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Freetown,

Following is the report of the Planning Board for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

During this fiscal year the Planning Board endorsed 5 Form A Approval Not Required under Subdivision Control plans resulting in the creation of 11 lots. The Planning Board collected \$1,100.00 in filing fees. The Board reviewed 2 Special Permits for new signs, collecting \$540.00 in fees. The Board reviewed 2 special permit and 4 site plan review projects resulting in the collection of \$870.00 in filing fees. The Board reviewed 4 subdivision applications collecting \$4,368.00 in filing fees. A total of \$6,748.67 in engineering review fees was collected for various projects.

During FY 13, the Board held a public hearing to review an article related to medical marijuana zoning that was submitted for the Annual Town Meeting. The article proposed restricting Registered Marijuana Dispensaries to the Industrial 2 district, and was passed by Town Meeting voters.

A technical assistance grant from South Coast Rail was awarded to the Town in FY13. The \$10,000 award allowed for SRPEDD to assist the Board on drafting Rules and Regulations for the Planned Mixed Use District (PMUD).

Planning Board members serving during FY13 include Chairman Robert Raymond (2014), Vice-Chairman Keven Desmarais (2016), Mark Rogers (2015), Mike Motta (2018) and Marc Tisdelle (2017). Jim Souza, the appointed alternate member of the Board, resigned during FY 13.

Long time Planning and Land Use Administrator Laurie Muncy resigned from her position with the Town during FY 13 to explore new opportunities. The Board wishes to express their deepest gratitude for her over 20 years of service and dedication to the Town of Freetown.

There is hereby established a Board of Appeals of three (3) members and two (2) associate members appointed by the Board of Selectmen, which shall act on all matters within its jurisdiction in the manner prescribed in Chapter 40A of the Massachusetts General Laws.

The Board of Appeals shall have the following powers:

- 1. To hear and decide appeals in accordance with Section 8 of Chapter 40A.
- 2. To hear and decide petitions for variances in accordance with Section 10 of Chapter 40A.
- 3. To hear and decide applications for those uses for which the provisions of this By-Law and for special permits when not otherwise specified, including the power to grant variances for use, Section 10, Chapter 40A.
- 4. To hear and decide applications for expansion of non-conforming uses. The Board of Appeals shall not grant approval for enlargement or extension unless it shall find that such extension shall not be substantially more detrimental to the neighborhood than the existing non-conforming use.

In exercising the powers granted by this section, the Board of Appeals shall act in accordance with the provisions of Section 11, 14, 15 and 16 of Chapter 40A of the General Laws.

During this Fiscal year the Zoning Board of Appeals has reviewed a total of nine special permit and variance requests. The Zoning Board of Appeals collected \$1,890.00 in applications fees.

The members of the Zoning Board of Appeals are Chairman Gary Guinen, Daniel Loranger and James Frates. Robert Jose is the alternate member of the Board.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the report of the Freetown Conservation Commission Department for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013.

The Freetown Conservation Commission is composed of six volunteers, appointed members serving to protect the wetland areas within the Town. Members are Keven Desmarais, Chairman, Charles Sullivan, Troy Audyatis, Janine Robidoux, Maria Ternullo, Christopher Mather, Karen Robitaille, Senior Clerk. The Commission reviews, and if appropriate, approves plans for any work that is contemplated either in or within 100 feet of wetlands. The Board also oversees implementation of the Rivers Protection Act. Both approval processes are to ensure that all work conducted in or near a wetland resource area will not have detrimental effect on the wetlands. Wetlands serve to provide storm and flood protection, pollution control, and most importantly, a habitat for various species of plant and animals. With the increased understanding of how wetlands interact with the water table combined with the reliance of well water for drinking in Freetown, it is extremely important that citizens feel free to contact the Commission when they feel that a project may be endangering wetlands.

The Commission has a small amount of acreage deeded to it in the form of gifts to the Town. This ownership by the Commission ensures that the property is available for all to enjoy while simultaneously protecting any wetlands that may be on it.

Notice of Intents and Abbreviated Notice of Resource Area Delineation require filing fees thus \$5,490.00 was collected during the fiscal year. From July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013 the Commission acted upon the following:

REPORT TO THE TOWN OF FREETOWN FROM THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SRPEDD)

The Town of Freetown is a member of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is the regional agency serving twenty-seven cities and towns in southeastern Massachusetts dealing with common issues facing our region, such as economic development, growth and land development, transportation, environment, municipal partnerships, and general planning for the future. SRPEDD is governed by a Commission of local mayors, selectmen, planning board members and at large members. We are funded by federal and state grants and local assessments. For 2013, the Town of Freetown paid \$1,432.77 to SRPEDD, based upon an assessment of 16.15 cents per capita.

Local citizens serving at SRPEDD included the following:

SRPEDD Commission: Richard Brown and Lauren Moreau Joint Transportation Planning Group: Richard Brown

Richard Brown also serves as a member of the Executive Committee.

Some of SRPEDD's more significant accomplishments during 2013 were:

- SRPEDD's **Municipal Partnership** program launched new efforts to help improve operating efficiencies of member cities and towns. The regional purchasing program combined the purchasing requirements of twenty five communities for a group purchase of office supplies, for a combined saving of \$700,000. We also conducted a group purchase for EMS supplies resulting in lower cost for participating fire and ambulance departments up to 60%. Grants were obtained to fund the implementation of electronic permitting for area building and health departments.
- The **Transportation Improvement Program** (**TIP**), which sets regional priorities for federal transportation funds, was completed and approved for FY2013-2016. The TIP targets apply to highway projects, and transit funds for GATRA and SRTA.
- Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for Southeastern Massachusetts, a regional economic development strategy, was completed and certified by the U.S. Economic Development Administration, making the region eligible for federal economic development grants from EDA.
- The **Taunton River** was designated by the US National Park Service as a **Wild and Scenic** River in 2009. The Taunton River Stewardship Council made up of locally appointed representatives from the ten municipalities abutting the Taunton River, along with supporting agencies, continues to meet regularly at SRPEDD to address protection of the river and its outstanding natural resources.
- South Coast Rail remained a major priority in 2013. SRPEDD assisted the SCR Corridor municipalities with a Five-Year Update of the Community Priority Areas and identified Priority Areas of Regional Significance. SRPEDD also continued to support the Southeastern Massachusetts Commuter Rail Task Force, which includes representation from SRPEDD municipalities and regional organizations.

- SRPEDD also provided technical assistance to fourteen communities through thirteen
 projects that implement the South Coast Rail Economic Development and Land Use
 Corridor Plan. Projects included zoning bylaw amendments, assistance with developing
 planning documents and renderings of possible future development under project
 proposals.
- SRPEDD continued as the designated sub-fiduciary agent to the Metropolitan Area Planning Council and the Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security (EOPSS) for the **Southeast Regional Homeland Security Advisory Council** serving 96 communities and the Wampanoag Nation in 6 counties in southeastern Massachusetts. The Council has awarded more than \$25.4 million in federal homeland security funds since 2004.
- SRPEDD conducts a **district-wide traffic counting program** (including speed surveys and vehicle classification, and 35 intersection turning movement counts) and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data throughout the region. SRPEDD undertook 100 traffic counts at various locations this past year.
- SRPEDD worked with the Massachusetts Gaming Commission to evaluate the impact of proposed slot parlors in Plainville and Raynham.
- An extensive **Geographic Information System (GIS)** mapping program is maintained by SRPEDD. Every year new computerized "data layers" are added to the system
- SRPEDD operates the **Southeastern Massachusetts Data Center**, providing information to businesses, cities and towns, and individuals.
- In cooperation with UMass Dartmouth, the **Southeastern Massachusetts Council on Sustainability** sponsored several workshops throughout the year.
- SRPEDD provides technical planning to two regional transit authorities, SRTA and GATRA, including: route evaluations, rider surveys, performance standards and federal reporting.
- SRPEDD maintains a comprehensive database of all 365 signalized intersections in the region. This includes geometry, traffic volume, crash rate, signal timing and operational characteristics.
- SRPEDD continued its affiliation with the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion.
- In addition, technical assistance was provided to the Town of Freetown in the following areas:
 - Conducted a group bid for Emergency Medical Supplies for use by the municipal ambulances. (DLTA)
 - Coordinated a group bid with the Town of Kingston for office supplies that resulted in a 54% discount off list price on over 300 items – Freetown participated. (DLTA)

- Submitted a Community Innovation Challenge Grant application to fund the implementation of a regional high resolution mapping and data layer project. (DLTA)
- Developed draft Rules and Regulations for Planned Mixed-Use Development (PMUD) Special Permit with the Planning Board. (SCR)
- Provided project management and technical assistance to the town and the consultant conducting a feasibility study to determine the suitability of the Freetown Screw site for the development of senior housing. (Contract)
- Assessed the flood hazard vulnerability of coastal transportation infrastructure, facilities, and marshland. (Island Foundation)
- Began conducting a road safety audit for Chace Road. (MassDOT)

SRPEDD was created to serve the cities and towns of southeastern Massachusetts. We are governed by elected and appointed officials from all the cities and towns. We look forward to serving you in the future.

As the interim superintendent of Schools for the Freetown-Lakeville Regional School District, it gives me great pleasure to submit the district's annual report for the 2012-2013 school year. Last year was a year of transition at central office and at the building administration level. The Assistant Superintendent, Jessica Huizenga, was appointed as interim superintendent of schools during the summer. Lisha Cabral, former 6-12 Humanities Coordinator, assumed some of the district job responsibilities associated with Dr. Huizenga's former position. At Apponequet Regional High School, Dave Patota left his position as middle school principal to assume the interim high school principal position. Ralph Olsen, a retired principal, was hired as interim middle school principal. At Freetown Elementary School, Stacey Soto was hired as the new principal.

While change can often provide the impetus for new ideas and innovation, too much change too quickly can create an atmosphere of inconsistency, instability and lack of clarity in vision and decision – making both at the district and building levels. However, the challenges faced last year by this district in administrative personnel turnover were buoyed by a dedicated veteran professional staff who provided the stability and focus in teaching and learning to all students. As is true with most strong performing organizations, its strength rests with those who are the closet to the center of its chief work...in this case educating our students. Our staff continues to be the backbone of the Freetown-Lakeville Regional School District. With the addition of our strong new central office and building level administrators, the district is posed to continue its journey toward educational excellence.

Change does not mean that progress stands still and to that end, I invite you to read the reports of the principals where they note the academic, athletic, and extra – curricular accomplishments of our students and staff. Our responsibility is to educate all students by providing equity and excellence in our programs and services. To that end, the educators in the Freetown-Lakeville Regional School District will continue to strive to attain this lofty goal.

APPONEQUET REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL

Dr. Barbara Starkie, Principal

Enrollment as of June 2013 was Grade 9 - 226 students, Grade 10 - 209 students, Grade 11 - 221 students, Grade 12 - 187 students and a total of 843 students enrolled at Apponequet. There was a 35-student increase in enrollment from the previous school year.

On May 28, 2013, Apponequet Regional High School held its annual **Senior Awards Night** in the Robert Falcon Auditorium at the high school. Local scholarships were awarded to 119 members of the Class of 2013. The Apponequet Scholarship Committee wishes to thank all of our local civic organizations for donating \$121,000 in scholarship money to our senior class.

The **Class of 2013** graduated on Friday, May 31, 2013, on Griffith Field at 6:00 PM. The class of 187 members was led by Class Valedictorian Abigail Couto and Class President Abby Treweek. The Charge to the Class was delivered by Joshua Coe. The Class of 2013 sent 110 of its members to four-year colleges and 47 to two year colleges and technical schools. Four members of the class are proudly serving their country in the military, and 14 students entered the workforce. Seventy five percent (75 %) of the members of the Class of 2013 took the **SAT's**. Mean scores were as follows: Critical Reading, 525; Math, 537; Writing, 531.

In May of 2013, **Advanced Placement** exams were administered in fourteen different subject areas: Biology, Calculus, Chemistry, English Literature, Environmental Science, European History, Microeconomics, Macro Economics, Physics, Psychology, Studio Art 2 D, Studio Art Drawing, Spanish Language and US History. Of the 243 exams administered, 173 were scored as a "3", "4" or "5". These scores may qualify students for advanced standing or college level credit at most colleges and universities. Apponequet increased the number of tests administered in 2013 by 49% and was named to the 4th annual "AP Honor Roll" by the College Board, an award that recognizes schools for "expanding opportunity and improving performance of AP students".

The **Guidance Department** and the Apponequet staff bid a fond farewell to long time guidance counselor Mark Gorman who retired after 35 years of service to the district. Ms. Nicole Graf worked as a guidance counselor in the department during a long-term maternity leave.

The **English Department** consisted of eight full-time teachers after a .6 reduction in the 2012-2013 school year. The reduction resulted in the loss of six sections of elective courses while one section of both Creative Writing and Public Speaking remained. There was an increase in students taking AP Literature with thirty-two students completing the course. Due to the increased interest, as well as the PSAT indicators for potential success on the AP exam, AP Language will be added in the next school year. Forty-eight students enrolled to take AP Language and fifty-eight students enrolled to take AP Literature. The ELA Department, once again, had students submit writing samples in order to compete for a spot at the Middlebury College Young Writers' Conference in Vermont. Judges from the collegiate level selected both Meghan Patrick (grade 11) and Lauren Tavares (Grade 10) to attend this prestigious conference.

The **Foreign Language Department** consisted of four (4) full time Spanish teachers and one (1) full time French teacher. In addition to the full-time positions, the department welcomed Dorian Popescu as a .6 French teacher and Susan Maltais as a .4 Spanish teacher. The department was hoping to add AP Spanish and French; but the budget did not permit it. AP Spanish is scheduled to run in the fall. The high school does not have language lab capabilities recommended for an AP language course; but the department is making technology accommodations.

During the 2012-2013 school year, the **History and Social Studies Department** participated in numerous annual traditions from Constitution Day to a visit to the JFK Library. For more than twenty-five years, in coordination with the East Freetown VFW post 6643, the History and Social Studies Department has participated in the national Voice of Democracy competition. More than 100 students participated. This year's winners received a combined \$1,000 in prizes, was awarded by Post 6643. This year's winners, of a combined \$1,000 in prizes. This year's winners were Amanda DuBois (1st), Jessica Darling (2nd), and Elizabeth Fournier (3rd). VFW Post 6643 also continues to fund the senior Social Studies Awards to four deserving seniors each May.

The **Math Department** took part in three curriculum writing professional days. These sessions consisted of using the new Common Core State Math Standards to create units in Rubicon Atlas, an online curriculum management program. Our ninth grade math team participated in an onsite graduate math course provided through Fitchburg State University titled, "*Decoding Common Core Mathematics in Grades 4-9*".

Marika Grossman was hired by the **Special Education Department** in August of 2012 to teach students with specific learning disabilities in mathematics. Erin Gibeau resigned as a Grade 9 and 10 math teacher in June of 2013.

During 2012-2013, the ARHS **Science Department** had a very busy and productive year. There were no retirements; however, three new teachers were hired. In May,2013, the science department held its annual Science Awards Ceremony to recognize top science students in each course. Also, awards were handed out to students who had received a 5 on their science AP exam from the previous school year. In all, over 70 students were honored with this award. In addition to the Science Awards Ceremony, the science department gave out awards at the senior awards night in May, 2013. The awards given out were certificates of recognition from the Boston chapter of the Society of Women Engineers, the Bausch and Lomb Scholarship for the University of Rochester, the Rensselaer Medal with a scholarship to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, and our annual Senior Science Award, given to the senior who has shown great achievement in his/her science classes, a high interest in the sciences and a desire to continue studying science in college.

The **Unified Arts department**, consisting of Art, Business/Technology, Health, Library, Music and Physical Education experienced some great successes as well as some changes during the 2012-2013 school year.

This year the **Art Department** remained with 1 FTE, servicing all grades. A large amount of time was spent on updating the Art curriculum to the UBD format.

The **Business/Technology Department** personnel remained at 2.0 FTE, hence impacting the number of courses that could be offered. The department updated its Freshmen Seminar curriculum to include the new guidance career and college readiness software package Navaince. The Workbased Learning and Community Service Learning Programs were initiated with successful placements in the community. The Department's **DECA** organization had 197 high school students that participated in various district, state and international competitions and conferences. The school store earned Gold Level Certification from DECA for having the highest standards for a school-based enterprise. Students in the department also experienced numerous learning opportunities/support from outside organizations. Junior Achievement presented their JA Success Skills Program as well sponsored a Job Shadow Day at Meditech in Fall River. Piper Jaffray presented their Taking Stock with Teens Program. Students participated in the WGBH High School Quiz Bowl, Bryant University Bulldog Challenge, MA Financial Regatta and the Stock Market Game.

The Apponequet High School **Library** was utilized by 20,705 students throughout the school year! This is an increase of 3,381 students using the library for school work before, during and after school to learn and do work. The Apponequet library enjoyed the assistance of two parent volunteers who helped shift shelves and gained a donation of a couch for students to enjoy in the "Literary Lounge". This year the George R. Austin Intermediate School, Freetown Lakeville Middle School and Apponequet High School all updated their library catalog program for finding and checking out books. The new program, called Destiny, is used already in the elementary schools. By the end of the 2014 school year, students should be able to search the resources available from home, renew their books, make recommendations to friends, and link to vetted sources through the Destiny program for their studies. Virtual High School students used the library computers and Wi-Fi to study classes not offered at Apponequet while in the library.

The **Health Department** had another busy year teaching all 10^{th} graders at Apponequet. The Health curriculum is also being updated and transferred over to the UBD format.

The **Music Department** had another busy year. The performing groups: Band, Jazz Ensemble, Jazz Combo, Choir and Select Choirs were very visible in the school community, presenting nearly 20 public performances and concerts. These performances included school concerts, football games, parades, the annual ARHS showcase at Lakeside Festival and the annual Holiday tour providing season's greetings to all five schools in our district. Individual music students represented Apponequet at music festivals sponsored by the Massachusetts Music Educators' Association (Southeast District) and the South Eastern Massachusetts School Bandmasters' Association. Apponequet was also represented at the 2013 Massachusetts Allstate Music Festival. A number of Band students participated in the second annual Bridgewater State University Honor Band Festival. A highlight of the year was a weekend trip to New York City to participate in the "Big Apple Classic" Music Festival, sponsored by Performing Arts Consultants. Our ensemble directors are: Band/Jazz Ensemble: Edward Ledwith; Choir: Dennis Robinson; Select Choirs: Beth Anne Young. Non-performance elective classes (Music Technology, Guitar, History of Rock, Music Theory) taught by Mr. Ledwith saw healthy enrollment during the year. The Apponequet Music Boosters continued their tradition of strong support for the music program.

The **Physical Education Department** received an addition to their teaching staff, Mr. Jonathan Stapleton, who accepted the .5 FTE, position. Jonathan, a former ARHS graduate is a welcomed addition to the department. Two seniors from the graduating class received the Physical Education Sportsmanship Award at Senior Awards night for their tireless efforts in Physical Education. This year's recipients were Allyson Buttermore and Timothy Moquin.

The Apponequet Athletic Department is a member of the South Coast Conference and we compete with area schools such as: Bourne, Case, Dighton-Rehoboth, Fairhaven, Greater N. B. Voc Tech., Old Rochester, Seekonk, and Wareham. We offer 23 Varsity sports that consist of 39 teams with the various Freshman, J.V. and Varsity levels. We have three distinct seasons: Fall, Winter and Spring.

Congratulations to the following teams for winning the South Coast Conference Championship during the 2012-13 academic year: Boy's Soccer, Girl' Soccer, Field Hockey - MIAA Division II South Sectional State Champions for the first time in school history, Boys Swimming - Southern Conference champs for the first time in school history, Softball, Girl's Tennis and Girl's Lacrosse.

Apponequet is excited to report 749 total athletic participants during the 2012-2013 academic year. Apponequet during this time is also pleased to report 426 students from a total enrollment of 842 students participated in at least one (1) sport for a school wide participation rate of 51%. This is considered an excellent ratio of participation with the athletic programs we offer. As a philosophy, we encourage our students to participate in multiple sports, 54% of our athletes

participated in at least two sport seasons per academic year. We are well within the limits of a 5% ratio for female and male sports compared to the school population for Title IX concerns. Apponequet athletes earned many All Conference awards as well as sportsmanship and honorable mention awards.

Athletic User Fees have generated approximately \$140,000.00 during this past academic year, directly supplementing the regional school budget. In addition to our athletic user fees, parents continue to offer support for our Apponequet students. The parent booster groups at Apponequet include the Music Boosters, the Athletic Boosters, the Football Grid Iron Club and the Laker Hockey Club.

FREETOWN-LAKEVILLE MIDDLE SCHOOL

Enrollment

The total enrollment at Freetown-Lakeville Middle School was 787. This was a 3.44% decrease from 2011.

Personnel

After over 33 years of teaching, 17 here at the middle school, special educator, Kathleen Prendergast retired. Two positions were added to our program for the 2012-2013 school year and were filled by Lorelle Govoni and Paul Courcy.

MCAS

The summary of the results of our Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) indicated that in English Language Arts, 82% of our 6th students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 72, 80% of our 7th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 51, and 87% of our 8th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 49. In mathematics 75% of our 6th students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 48, 53% of our 7th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 42, and 72% of our 8th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 72.5.

Charitable Work

Freetown-Lakeville Middle School once again participated in the "Pennies" fundraiser. Our students and staff are encouraged to donate their spare change to support of the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, which is the world's largest voluntary health organization dedicated to funding blood cancer research and providing education and patient services. The goal for the program is not only to raise money for research and patient services, but also to teach children about blood cancers, philanthropy, team work, and helping those who are less fortunate. Last year the FLMS raised \$2,756.69. Over the past seven years we have raised over \$30,000.

Friends of Rachel

The 2012-2013 8th grade Friends of Rachel group had 130 members from the 7th and 8th grade classes. All students who participated helped spread the message of kindness and compassion throughout our school and worked to promote our core values of respect, responsibility, and resilience through multiple student initiatives that spread kindness.

Teams and Clubs

Students in all grades participated in student council, yearbook club, band, choir, majorettes, and the boys' and girls' basketball teams.

NJHS

The National Junior Honor Society had 83 members who maintained a high GPA while engaging in school and community service

projects. The scholars' community service work included recycling, serving as library aids, and providing assistance for the non profit organizations. Students also completed individual community service projects outside of school.

PCC

The middle school also had over 20 students attend Project Contemporary Competitiveness (PCC) at Stonehill College. PCC provides an intellectually enriching and socially stimulating residential summer program over the course of six weeks.

The Fine Arts

The drama club presented school and evening performances of *The Music Man*. The play, with a cast and crew of 80, was performed for over 900 audience members. We also had many students perform for audiences during our winter concert and our concert in the spring. Both evenings showcased the talents of art students as well as our musicians

Library/Media Services

The school library and its staff continued to be a wonderful resource for the students and staff. The annual total of library materials circulated was 13,791 and the student visits to the library were 26,465

GEORGE R. AUSTIN INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL

Bethany Pineault, Principal

Enrollment as of June 2013 was Grade 5 -249 students and Grade 4 - 244 students for a total of 493 students enrolled at GRAIS.

In the 2012-2013 academic year, the George R. Austin Intermediate School became a regionalized grades 4-5 school. This required the restructuring of the building to provide the teaching and support staff necessary to support student learning. The following staff were new to GRAIS as of September 2012:

The staff has been working significantly on aligning curriculum to the Common Core standards, and creating a consistent delivery of instruction for all students. As a team, we have been focused on working towards the district goals and the school improvement plan, where we focus on our work as a cohesive team, using data to drive instruction and implementing best teaching practices amongst all classrooms.

Reading Incentive

The School set a reading goal to read one million minutes by June, 2013. We "Trekked to Texas" and had each minute represent our feet and miles. The students accomplished the mission and we then celebrated with a Texas Hoe-down! Students learned line-dancing and square-dancing and all dressed in their cowboy gear. It was a fabulous event – YEHAW!

Austin Pride

Each semester, students were honored for exhibiting one or more of our Core Values: P.R.I.D.E. (perseverance, respect, Inspiration, determination and equality) Each time a child or class exhibits one of these qualities, a ticket is earned. As a result of meeting it's goal of 10,000 tickets, a school wide celebration was held at the end of the year.

Annual Events

November Turkey Trot: Mr. Ireland, Physical Education Teacher, promotes physical fitness with a one-mile trot/run around the GRAIS campus.

Fall Scholastic Book Fair: We raised enough money to purchase document cameras for 15 of the GRAIS teachers. The remaining will be purchased during the 2013-2014 school year.

MCAS Prep Rally: We reviewed the purpose of the test, discussed strategies, reviewed data and set goals. We were also treated to a presentation by the FLMS Majorettes as part of the rally.

PTO Events: Halloween Social, Luau and Snowflake Social

Survivor Day: A spin off of track & field day where sports are mixed with arts and crafts, building structures and team building activities.

FREETOWN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Mrs. Kimberly Sefrino, Principal

For the 2012-2013 academic year, Freetown Elementary School's total enrollment was 432, servicing students in Pre-Kindergarten – Grade 3. This indicates a 121-student decrease as the enrollment for 2011-2012 was 553 children. However, FES educated Grade 4 students during the 2011-2012 school year and not in 2012-2013 as all Grade 4 students were transferred to George R. Austin Intermediate School. Additionally, READS Collaborative educated pre-school students with cochlea implants at FES.

The 2012-2013 school year brought seven new employees to FES. Stacey Soto was hired as the new principal while Carissa Bailey joined the staff as a music teacher, Kristen Brousseau as an integrated pre-kindergarten teacher, Shalem Kaufer as a literacy coach, Erin Maguire as the teacher of a substantially separate pre-school program, Stephanie St. Onge as a part-time kindergarten teacher and Joseph Tripp as the facility's custodial day supervisor. Diane Huling, a second grade teacher, left Freetown Elementary School after accepting a literacy coach position at George R. Austin Intermediate School. Jean Tavares, a special educator, moved to Freetown Lakeville Middle School.

Grade 3 teachers received the Yellow School Bus Grant for \$250.00 for a field trip to the New Bedford Whaling Museum as a culminating activity following the whales and whaling unit. Grade 3 was also involved in a grant opportunity to teach a drafted unit from the Massachusetts WGBH Model Units. Each class piloted the Biography Unit and received an iPad, document camera and all the materials to teach the unit.

Several Grade 1 teachers requested funds from donorschoose.org and received grants for a set of four flower-shaped tables to replace student desks valued at \$1200 and a leveled library for reading instruction valued at \$900.

The Freetown Elementary School mascot, Felix the Fox was adopted by a vote of students and staff. Fox Tales was also a big hit among FES students. Students were encouraged to write summaries of books they read during the week and then were featured during morning announcements. Several new interventions, Lexia and Great Leaps, were introduced at FES to provide teachers with resources to close the literacy gap of students performing below grade level.

Freetown Elementary School's Grade 3 students participated in Reading Comprehension and Mathematics MCAS in Spring 2013. Reading results indicate that 9% scored Advanced, 54% scored Proficient, 35% scored Needs Improvement and 2% scored Warning. Mathematics performance resulted in 24% Advanced, 40% Proficient, 31% Needs Improvement and 5% warning.

Students were recognized for being good role models through the Principal's Praise Program. The parents of deserving students received telephone calls to share the observance of desired behaviors rather than parent contact for problems and/or concerns.

Based on 2013 MCAS results, Freetown Elementary School was named a Level 1 school by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, the highest ranking a school may achieve.

A Grade 3 Chorus was formed in Fall 2012. Third grade students practiced weekly and presented several concerts for the entire school and parents in the winter and spring.

A Cup Stacking Night was held in December 2012. Families were invited to participate in this fast growing international sport. Participants were challenged to beat their own time as they stacked and disassembled groups of cups. While parents initially kept to the sidelines, they quickly joined in the fun and joined their children in the competition. Admission to this event was a nonperishable food item or pair of pajamas that were donated to charitable organizations.

A Holiday Story Hour took place in early December 2012. Grade 1 students were read classic Christmas tales and were treated to cookies and milk while wearing their pajamas. Kindergarten students and their parents participated in designing a gingerbread house.

Freetown Elementary School participated in the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital's Math-A-Thon in February 2013, ranking 46th out of more than 7000 schools in the United States that joined in the fundraiser. FES students raised \$11,258.71 for this organization.

An Art Show was held in May 2013 to showcase student work. All students in Kindergarten – Grade 3 were included by displaying two – three pieces of art. Their creations were exhibited throughout the school.

The Freetown Elementary School PTO has been instrumental in bringing many wonderful programs and family events to our school. They have also raised substantial funds and contributed them to the school and individual classrooms to enhance instruction and cultural experiences.

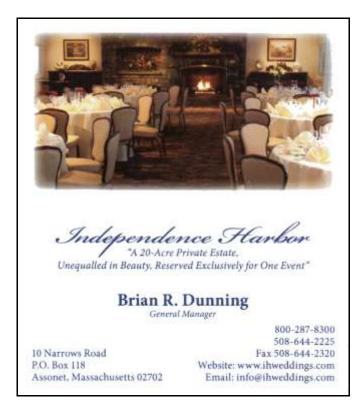
