The following is a report of the Town Clerk's Department for the fiscal year July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015.

<u>**TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE**</u>: The Assistant Town Clerk, Diane L. Souza retired on 12/31/2014 after 13 years of service in the Town Clerk's Office. Diane served 5 years as Senior Clerk and then was appointed to Assistant Town Clerk in 2006. On 12/9/2014, Cheryl Estrella was appointed as Senior Clerk in the office of the Town Clerk.

### ELECTIONS:

- <u>State Primary</u>- The State Primary was held on September 9, 2014 with a 14% turn out.
- <u>State Election</u>- On November 4, 2014 the State Election was held to vote for the positions of Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of the Commonwealth, etc. There was a 55% turn out for this election.
- <u>Local Annual Election</u>- There was a 3% turn out for the annual town election that was held on April 6, 2015. There were 18 positions available on the ballot. There was no contested race on the ballot.
- <u>Prop 2 ½ Debt Exclusion</u>- A debt exclusion election was held on June 22, 2015 with a ballot referendum question in regards to repairing the Richmond Rd Bridge. The funding was previously approved at the ATM held on 6/5/2015 contingent upon passage of the referendum. There was a 2.4% turn out for this election. The referendum question failed.

### October 27, 2014 – Special Town Meeting

The Special Town Meeting was held at the Freetown Elementary School Auditorium with 59 registered voters in attendance to vote on 20 articles.

### Highlights:

- *Article 1-* Approved town's share (\$9,500) of FEMA assistance grant to purchase a 2000 gallon tanker trunk.
- Article 3- Approved (\$30,000) to purchase and install play structures for town parks.
- *Article 5-* Approved purchase and installation (\$4,963.87) of snowplow equipment for the Highway Dept.'s 2014 Ford pickup.
- *Article 6* Approved reimbursement (\$9,946.80) to a town retiree of a retroactive Medicare penalty.
- Article 11-Authorized Board of Selectmen to enter into a renewable energy power purchase and/or net metering credit agreement.
- Article 13- Authorized Board of Selectmen to accept an easement to widen the intersection of Ridge Hill Rd & So Main St.
- Article 14 and Article 15- 0 Rt. 24 (Innovation Way) Map 236, Parcel 6 and Parcel 6.01 designated Priority Dev. Sites.
- Article 20- 170 South Main St (Map 233, Parcel 30) designated as a Priority Dev. Site.

Total appropriations approved: \$133,125.62 by Free Cash

### November 19, 2014 – Special Town Meeting

The Special Town Meeting was held at the Freetown Elementary School Auditorium with 127 registered voters in attendance to vote on 1 article.

### June 15, 2015 – Special Town Meeting

### <u>Highlights:</u>

- *Article 9-* Approved (\$40,000) to purchase water lines & steel protective sleeves for 3 railroad crossings (Elm St, High St & Copicut Rd).
- *Article 11*-Approved (\$133,665) to pay Freetown's portion of the regional school district transportation.

- *Article 12-* Approved (\$3,542) Old Colony Reg. High School transportation assessment costs.
- *Article 13*-Accepted MGL enterprise provisions for the purpose of creating a cable television public access enterprise fund (\$24,407).
- Article 15-Authorized Board of Selectmen to work with Acushnet Selectmen in acquiring land in Acushnet to build 64 units of Senior housing in Freetown.
- *Article 16*-Approved the funding (\$1,500) to address environmental conditions and removal of acquired Acushnet property for Senior housing.

The Finance Committee is the budgetary watchdog of the town. It was established so a group of representative taxpayers could conduct a thorough review of municipal finance questions on behalf of all residents.

The members of the Finance Committee are here for you, the taxpayer, and we review all budgets with the Board of Selectmen. We put in countless hours of review with each town budget and work hand-in-hand with the Selectmen in reviewing these department budgets for your arrival at town meeting. Please note that your Selectmen set all fiscal policy voted on at town meeting. The Finance Committee only makes recommendations to the Selectmen and to you at town meeting.

Your Finance Committee also watches over the Reserve Fund, which has been set at \$125,000.00 for the past fiscal year. This fund is set aside for unforeseen expenditures. It is dispersed by transfers approved by the Finance Committee, and we try to make sure all departments use all budgeted funds before we will allocate more from the Reserve Fund. We are rigorous in protecting these funds so they are properly used.

The following is the Annual Report of the Freetown Police Department for Fiscal Year July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015:

#### Mission Statement

The Freetown Police Department is committed to providing the highest level of public safety and service to the citizens and business people within the community. The members of the Department are empowered to enforce the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the bylaws of the Town of Freetown to ensure that the peace and tranquility of our community is maintained and that crime and the fear of crime are reduced.

#### Core Values

The following values guide our work:

**Integrity** – We adhere to the highest moral and ethical standards. We are honest and sincere in dealing with each other and the community. We have the courage to uphold these principles and are proud that they guide us in all we do.

**Respect** – We recognize the value of individuality and treat all people with dignity. We cherish, defend and protect the rights, liberties and freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution.

**Fairness** – We are consistent in our treatment of all persons. Our actions are tempered with reason, equity, and governed by law.

#### **Accreditation**

The Department achieved Accreditation through the Massachusetts Police Accreditation Commission during 2014 and continues to meet or exceed the 323 professional standards that were established for the profession, by the profession. These carefully selected standards reflect critical areas of police management, operations, and technical support activities. They cover areas such as policy development, emergency response planning, training, communications, property and evidence handling, use of force, vehicular pursuit, prisoner transportation and holding facilities. This program not only sets standards for the law enforcement profession, but also for the delivery of police services to the residents of the Freetown.

#### **Grants**

The Department was successful in obtaining state 9-1-1 Department grant monies. These monies were used for the training dispatch personnel, purchase and installation of wireless modems in police vehicles thus allowing on board computers to communicate with the 911 computer system, and for the purchase of document management software used in conjunction with training.

### <u>Training</u>

Department training included the use of a document management program made available online to all officers and signal operators. This grant-funded program allowed the Department to manage crucial documents, train and test employees, and maintain accreditation standards thereby reducing risk and expanding productivity, efficiency, time and money.

### **Facility**

The existing police facility is inadequate for the safety, security and equipment needs of a department our size and the demands placed upon it.

#### **Regional Collaboration**

The Department is a member of the Southeastern Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council (SEMLEC) and has access to important resources, including search and rescue, canine, rapid response, tactical, marine, and dive team units. SEMLEC consists of 29 area police departments sharing knowledge, personnel and equipment.

#### Firearm Licensing

The Department processed 117 License to Carry (LTC) and 12 Firearm Identification Card (FID) applications, including original and renewals. The Department suspended or revoked 6 LTCs and 1 FID.

## **REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Freetown:

The following is the Annual Town Report of the Freetown Fire Department for the fiscal year of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015

The Freetown Fire Department would like to thank the community and the Board of Selectmen for their continued support this year. Community support is paramount, and we realize without such support we would be unable to provide the utmost professional fire and rescue service to the community. We are constantly striving to improve our organization and our delivery of fire-rescue services to the community, a service both our residents and visitors expect and deserve.

The Freetown Fire Department responded to 1,785 calls for service during the last fiscal year, which is represented as follows:

On March 7<sup>th</sup>, 2015 the department took delivery of a 2014 Kenworth 2,000 gallon tanker truck. This vehicle was purchased with funds from a federal grant and was placed in-service at Station 2. Additionally, and with funding from another federal grant, an air cylinder filling station was purchased and placed in service at Station 3 in October of 2014.

The department also received a Public Safety 'SAFE' Grant in the amount of \$7,218.00, and a Department of Conservation and Recreation "Volunteer Fire Assistance" Grant DCR amount of \$745.00. The SAFE Grant was used to train and equip firefighters to be public fire education instructors and conduct fire safety classes throughout town. Additionally, funding from SAFE grant was used to purchase the necessary equipment to install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in the homes of our elderly and other needy families. The smoke and carbon monoxide detectors were donated to the fire department by Tyco Security Products / DSC. The DCR grant was used to purchase new forestry hose.

Call Firefighters Mallorie Brouns, Kyle Olsen and Jonathan Simmons, successfully completed Massachusetts Firefighting Academy Call/Volunteer Firefighter Training Class # 053 to become trained to the NFPA 1001 Firefighter I/II standard. This training consists of over two hundred hours of classroom and hands on training and testing through academic exams and practical skill applications. This program is time and labor intensive and speaks volumes of the dedication and commitment to serving the town by these firefighters.

Firefighters performed 291 in-service inspections and issued 258 permits during the past fiscal year. These inspections included schools, churches, daycare centers and commercial properties as well as smoke and carbon monoxide inspections for new and resale homes. In addition to their normal station cleaning, hose testing, and equipment and vehicle maintenance duties, fire

department members have attended a combined 2,771 hours of fire training both in-house and at Massachusetts Firefighting Academy sponsored programs.

Last fiscal year, 448 open-air burning (brush) permits were issued. Burning season begins January 15<sup>th</sup> and runs through May 1<sup>st</sup> (weather permitting). Burning permits are available on-line or can be obtained in person at the Bullock Road Fire Station (Sta.3) beginning January 1<sup>st</sup> each year. Burning hours are between 10AM and 4PM, but residents must notify the fire department either by logging in on-line or by calling the Fire Station each day before they burn to confirm that burning is allowed that day. No daily authorizations to burn brush will be given after 2 p.m.

The town's three (3) fire stations are in relatively good shape but in need some repairs and cosmetic work. Firefighters continue to volunteer their time remodeling Station 2's kitchen and bathrooms. With funding approved at the annual town meeting the septic system at Station 3 will be replaced in the next year.

As per NFPA 1901, standard for Automotive Fire Apparatus, the town's four (4) Class A Pumpers and Aerial Ladder received their annual performance test and the results are as follows:

With funding approved at the annual town meeting, an additional radio communications repeater was installed on the forest fire lookout tower in the State Forest to enhance radio communications in and around the Assonet Village area.

The demands placed on our services is growing every year. The fire department now averages over 1700 calls for service per year. With increasing administrative demands place on our two person duty crew and the reduction in the availability of day time on-call personnel, we are stretching our system to the limit. There are many times during the year when the duty crew is at an incident or out of town transporting a patient to the hospital, leaving no one at the fire station and the ambulance(s) unstaffed. On several occasions this past year, due to lack of available EMT's we had to rely on neighboring communities to provide an ambulance on second medical calls while our duty crew was tied up on another call. Additional daytime staffing would go far to meeting the community's expectation of a timely response during emergencies.

In closing, I would like to take a moment to mention our unsung heroes, the Freetown Communications Center personnel. Our signal operators are dedicated professionals who work behind the scenes to provide a vital link between the town's emergency services and those in need. We could not perform our duties effectively without them.

## **REPORT OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Freetown:

The following is the Annual Town Report of the Freetown Emergency Management Agency for the fiscal year of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015

Emergency Management Agency members were pressed into service during the severe winter weather during the months of January and February of 2015. The Town filed an Emergency Declaration with the Commonwealth to ensure eligibility for reimbursement of storm related costs. Members assisted in opening a warming shelter in January at the Freetown Multi-Purpose Center and along with Lakeville's EMA opened and staffed a Regional Shelter at the GRAIS in Lakeville during the severe snow storm on February 26-27. At the local level we have identified the Freetown Multi-Purpose Center located at 227 Chace Road as our initial shelter & warming / cooling site. As the scope of an event broadens we would then move our shelter operations to GRAIS which is bigger facility and better equipped to handle large numbers of people.

The Freetown Emergency Management Agency received a federal grant in FY 15 in the amount of \$4,849.75 which was used to enhance our emergency operations center capabilities. Additionally, through MEMA we obtained a limited amount of equipment to equip our local Community Emergency Response Team (CERT).

Emergency Management is always looking for volunteers and other interested persons to become members of our local Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) which sponsored by the Fire Department. Residents can also attend, without any commitment to serve on the CERT, safety and preparedness training to better prepare themselves in the event that a significant or manmade disaster should occur.

In addition to attending numerous training opportunities, our EMA volunteers continue to review and update the Town's Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan and are currently developing a shelter plan to address sheltering strategies at both the local and regional levels.

Freetown EMA is a strong advocate of all hazard, personal and family safety emergency preparedness. In an emergency, the assets of local and state agencies will be taxed to their fullest and will take time to respond. The first response to disaster and recovery is a coordinated effort of neighbor helping neighbor. Every person and family should have an All-Hazard Disaster Plan and a Family Communication Plan. FEMA encourages everyone to have a readily accessible Go-Kit to get you through the first 72 hours of any emergency. The kit should be tailored to the special requirements of each member of the family. Don't forget to prepare a kit for each of your pets. Your kit may be your best friend during and following a disaster.

In closing, I would like to thank all of the volunteers who have helped out in the past year.

Following is the report of the Highway Department for the fiscal year July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015.

Using Chapter 90 funds, the following projects were completed: Lang Road was graded and paved; Amanda Road, Chace Road (in the vicinity of Route 140), Dakel Drive, and Jethol Drive were shimmed and paved; Chace Road from Braley Road to Bullock Road, Chipaway Road, and Long Pond Road were shimmed and chip-sealed; and engineering was completed for planned repairs to the Maple Tree Crossing bridge on Richmond Road.

Other road repairs were carried out as follows: Berms were built on Howland Road; sidewalks were repaired on North Main Street; catch basins, culverts, and drain lines were repaired or installed on Burns Lane, Cliff Drive, Copicut Road, Copley Drive, Dr. Braley Road, Dunham Road, High Plains Street, Howland Road, Jordan Lane, Kelly Drive, Kenneth Pettey Drive, Martin Drive, Narrows Road, Richmond Road, Rounsevell Drive, Shannon Lane, Simmons Street, Simpson Lane, Slab Bridge Road, and Winslow Way. In addition, brush was cutback along roadways where needed and bicycle racks obtained by the Planning Board were installed at several parks

The 1994 one-ton dump truck was lost to a fire in January. No new vehicles or equipment were purchased during this year. Additionally, no new roads were accepted.

The Highway Department assisted with setting up for the Independence Day parade and fireworks, all elections, the Robinson Estates Yard Sale, the Town Christmas Tree Lighting, Lakeside Festival, and the Strawberry Festival. Assistance was also rendered to the Tree Warden as needed. In addition, all routine tasks were performed such as snowplowing, sanding, sweeping roads, mowing the Assonet Burying Ground, boat ramp, libraries, town parks, roadsides, ball fields, and the transfer station; replacing signs, painting signs, and the general maintenance of the town and its equipment.

### **REPORT OF THE WATER DEPARTMENT**

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the report of the Water Commission for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015.

The Water and Sewer Commission is comprised of three (3) members who are elected to serve three (3) terms. The members are:

Michael P. Pillarella, term expires 2016 Bradford Paiva, term expires 2017 Robert Parker, term expires 2018

The Freetown Water and Sewer Commission is responsible for providing quality drinking water to cover 625 customers both in Assonet and Freetown. We have approximately 17 miles of water supply lines, a booster pump station located on East Chipaway Road and a canister filtration site located on South Main Street. The Freetown Water and Sewer Commission purchases water from both Fall River and New Bedford which makes us a Conservative Water System. We are required by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection to perform periodic testing to ensure that our water meets or exceeds all local, state and federal drinking water standards. Our Annual Drinking Water Quality Report is available at the Town Hall located at 3 North Main Street, Assonet. Additionally, the Water and Sewer Commission has two (2) sewer customers that we are responsible for.

The Freetown Water and Sewer Commission operates using an Enterprise account which allows us to operate with only the monies collected through permitting fees and usage charges. We do not utilize any general fund or tax dollars to operate.

The Freetown Water and Sewer Commission contracts with White Water Inc. as their licensed operator which allows us to meet the minimum staffing requirements, as prescribed by DEP, for a water system of our size. Other employees include:

### **REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMISSION**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the report of the Cemetery Commission for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015.

Before entering into this year's report, we wish to thank Diane Souza, who retired from the position of Assistant Town Clerk on December 31st. If you have phoned the town hall in the last fourteen years to inquire about one of the cemeteries, chances are good that you've spoken with Diane. We will all miss her helpful nature, wonderful sense of humor, and upbeat presence. We wish her the very best for a long and happy retirement!

#### Assonet Burying Ground

We continue to receive high praise for the improved appearance of the cemetery, both through the efforts of the Highway Department and those of Richard Brown, who continues to volunteer his expertise and a very great deal of his time on a variety of projects. We extend our sincere thanks to all these gentlemen. We were also pleased with the results we saw as we began testing the use of "D/2", an environmentally-friendly product for cleaning blackened headstones.

There were nineteen interments in the Assonet Burying Ground during the fiscal year, formerly residing as follows: Assonet (10), Berkley (1), Fall River (4), Leeds (1), Myricks (1); Lakewood, N.J. (1); and Morgan City, La. (1). Seven were men and twelve were women. The youngest person interred was 49 and the eldest three were 93. Four were veterans of the following wars: World War II (2) and the Vietnam War (2).

Regretfully, in the spring, we found it necessary to remove the trash barrels from the cemetery as too many people were confusing the cemetery for the landfill. The final straw was the microwave oven that appeared during the winter months. Should anyone witness inappropriate dumping in any cemetery, please inform the Cemetery Commission or the police.

#### **Other Cemeteries**

Other cemeteries maintained throughout the year included the two cemeteries at Braley's Station, the East Freetown Cemetery, the Michael Hathaway Burial Ground, the Mother's Brook Cemetery, the Plummer Burial Ground, the Quaker Hill Cemetery, the Richmond Cemetery, and the Tisdale Burying Ground. The Haskins Cemetery was also looked after, but no labor was undertaken. A tree in the Plummer Burial Ground that had been struck by lightning alerted us to the need to take an inventory of what trees we had that should be removed for reasons of safety. The Cemetery Commission also assisted with one burial in the Evans Cemetery for a former resident, late of Tiverton, aged 108.

Volunteer maintenance and other projects were carried out this year as follows: Trees were removed from the Nichols Cemetery by Dan Reis and Mark Mulrooney and several broken headstones in the Crapo Cemetery were repaired by Jeff King. Those wishing to care for an abandoned cemetery are asked to contact the Cemetery Commission in advance for permission and guidance.

#### Veterans' Graves

All known veterans' graves are marked with flags prior to Memorial Day each year. This yearly tradition is a way of remembering the sacrifices made by the hundreds of soldiers and sailors buried in town. If you are aware of a veteran's grave which is not being marked, or have questions regarding veterans' benefits, please contact Bob Klevecka, Veterans Graves Officer for the town.

Also during this fiscal year, we applied to the VA to replace damaged or weatherworn headstones in the Braley's Station cemeteries marking the graves of Civil War veterans. The VA agreed to replace two (E. Haskell and J. Pittsley, 2nd) and declined to replace the other four.

#### Gravediggers

As of January 1, 2011, a license is required of any person who wishes to dig graves in the town's public cemeteries. The fee for obtaining a license was set at \$1.00 per year, with licenses issued for five years at a time (or, \$5.00 each time a license is issued or renewed). Currently, the following are so licensed:

Our fees were updated on January 5, 2015. A single grave for a resident was reduced to \$750.00, and for nonresidents was increased to \$1,000.00. A cremation lot for residents remained \$300.00, and for nonresidents increased to \$500.00. Discounts remain in place for veterans outside the Veterans Section, and lots in the Veterans Section are now free. Anyone wishing to purchase a lot, or to add to a cemetery's perpetual care endowment, is encouraged to contact a member of the Cemetery Commission, and we will be happy to oblige.

### **REPORT OF THE COUNCIL ON AGING DEPARTMENT**

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

The fiscal year of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015 has been both challenging and rewarding.

Some programs offered this year are Referral Service, Blood Pressure Screening, Carbon Monoxide/Smoke detectors through the Fire Department, Fuel Assistance applications, Prescription Advantage applications, Flu clinic, Podiatry clinic, Exercise programs, AARP Tax Preparation, Line dancing, Bingo, Card games of Pitch and Garbage, Food Pantry, Meals on Wheels, Catered lunches, Muffins and Ice cream socials, Knitting, May breakfast, Kanakis Produce, Brown Bag, Senior Work off Program, Legal Referrals, Legislative hours, Medical Equipment Loans, Pool Table, Painting Class, Birthday Party, Handicap Transportation, SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders) Free books and puzzle exchange, Volunteer opportunities.

Brown Bag program is for eligible seniors to receive free groceries once a month from the Boston Food Bank. Many devoted volunteers go to Taunton to pick up the bags. They are distributed from the senior center and some are delivered. We serve 121 eligible seniors on this program.

The Council on Aging receives donations to help needy families in town regardless of age. Volunteers help with stocking this room with donations from Stop & Shop Warehouse, United Church of Assonet, Tuesday Club, Saint John Nuemann Parish , Happy Hearts from Berkley and citizens donate monthly of cleaning, personal and non-perishable products. We currently serve 143 families. Any resident that receives help from the state is eligible for this program.

Grants are written for individual seniors to fix their homes for health and safety. Through the USDA Rural Development qualified seniors can receive up to \$7500.00 (Seven thousand five hundred) to fix their home. Some examples are deck repair, doors, heating systems, railings, steps, roof work and new windows.

A Formula Grant is written to help with printing and mailing of our newsletter. It can also help pay for utilities for the building and various other purchases that the Council on Aging board feels are needed within the State guidelines.

Free luncheons were held for seniors: Christmas luncheon sponsored by our Legislative Representatives held at the Freetown VFW, Stop & Shop gave two cook outs, United Calvary Church held 3 luncheons.

Thank you to the Freetown VFW for letting the Council on Aging use their hall every Wednesday. We have activities that cannot be held here because we do not have the capacity to hold that many participants.

Donations we have received in goods and services totaled approximately \$15,252.00. Volunteers saved the town approximately \$32,250.00 in volunteer hours.

The 2010 Federal Census the number of seniors in town was 1751. According to the Town Census for January 2015 we have 2474.

### REPORT OF THE OFFICE OF VETERANS SERVICES DEPARTMENT

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown

The following is the Report of the Office of Veterans' Services for Fiscal Year July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015.

This office has seen several changes during FY15. The position of Director/Veterans Agent has changed hands three times. This Office would like to extend our deepest gratitude to Donald J. "Dan" Le Blanc and Tracy A. Knowles for their dedication to the Veterans and their families.

Another important change is the new mandatory requirement for the Director/Veterans Agent to be certified by the Department of Veteran Services by attending training and passing a written exam.

Also this office has seen an increase in the number of clients providing twenty one clients/families with Massachusetts General Law (M.G.L.) Chapter 115 and Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) benefits. Provided financial assistance this past year to these clients was in the amount of \$162,232.07. All benefits that were provided were audited by both the Town Auditor and the Massachusetts Department of Veterans' Services which did not report any discrepancies. The office has had a full 75% reimbursement of expenses incurred in the amount of \$121,674.05, which will be issued to the town in the next fiscal year.

Over the past year this office has provided assistance and guidance to more than the twenty one active clients and other Veterans and their families, receiving hundreds of calls and questions regarding veteran status, obtaining Veteran Discharges (DD214/553), requests for metals/ribbons, Department of Veterans' Affairs eligibility for health care, burial benefits, Veteran ID cards and Veteran driver's license initiative through the Registry of Motor vehicles as well as entitlement to both State and Federal benefits.

We also work with Mr. Michael McCue and the Cemetery Commission to identify and maintain flags in cemeteries in Town where veterans' may are buried. Last year we flagged over 650 graves at 14 cemeteries in East Freetown and Assonet replacing old worn flags with new flags and providing new veteran flag holders where necessary. The cost for these flags last year was \$600.48. Seventy five percent of this cost is reimbursed by the State DVS. All other flags purchased are our responsibility last year we expended at total of \$2,200.00 on flags and wreaths for Memorial Day and the Fourth of July. I wish also, to personally thank the members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Freetown Memorial, Post 6643 and the Assonet American Legion, Post 0425 and the parents and members of Boy Scout Troops in Assonet and East Freetown who assisted in the Memorial Day flagging of the veteran graves. Without their help every year this would not be possible.

### **REPORT OF THE LIBRARY DEPARTMENT**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Freetown:

The following is the report of the Library department for the period July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015.

<u>Library Trustees:</u> This years' Board consisted of Lucille M. Rose (Chair); Irene Ashley (Vice-chair), Michael McCue (Secretary), Vincent Kyne, Christine Paiva and Joseph Zinni.

<u>Children's Programs:</u> We usually offer our "Story Hour" and any other programs after January. This year we had programs scheduled but they had to be cancelled due to the ongoing furnace and plumbing problems were not rectified until much later in the year. These problems made it impossible to conduct any programming in the library.

There was an Earth Day Program held at the Hathaway Library in Assonet. This program was sponsored by the Friends of the Freetown Libraries. It was the first Earth Day in many years that was held at the Hathaway Library. The children that attended were given seedlings to plant at home and they also helped with the leave clean-up around the outside of the library. This program was to teach the children the importance of our environment.

We have also offered Technical Support service to our patrons. What this means is that is they are having problems with their iPad/tablet, they bring them into the library and Ms. Pittsley will show them step by step how to operate them. This is especially true when it comes to learning how to download an audio book or an eBook using Overdrive from the SAILS Network. This service has been extremely helpful to many of our patrons. Many patrons take advantage of this service.

This year, like all of the previous years, we were able to supplement the summer reading lists that were provided to us by the surrounding schools. These books are always in high demand because many schools require their students to read the same titles as our schools in the network.

We joined the Commonwealth EBook program this year. This is sponsored by The Massachusetts Library System. This new programs offer our patrons more EBooks. The EBooks from this platform comes from Baker & Taylor one of the largest distributors of fiction in the country. Patrons can access this virtually the same way as they use Overdrive from SAILS, all they have to do is download an app on their phone, tablet, or computer and register by using their library card. By joining this new service our patrons have a vast amount of electronic materials at their disposal. This program has gotten off to a slow start due to many glitches that the Library System experienced with this new platform and also getting the word out to our patrons about this new service was slow going.

Library visits, internet use, and resource sharing all slightly decreased in FY15. According to Deborah Conrad, Executive Director of SAILS Library Network, there was on overall circulation decreased FY15 of all libraries in the SAILS Network, also during the winter months the James White Library had to close on numerous occasions due to the furnace and plumbing problems. Circulation for FY 15 was 15,534. The use of Overdrive increased this year. There were 177 audio books downloaded, 1,356 EBooks downloaded, and 79 children's books were viewed using the Tumblebook service. We loaned 8,886 pieces of materials to other libraries in the SAILS Network and we borrowed 5,221 pieces of materials from other libraries in the SAILS Network. This reflects slight decrease from last year. We borrowed 22 pieces of materials from library outside of the

network and loaned 26 pieces of materials from libraries out of the network. All of this would not have been possible if we were not certified by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners.

This year, we continued with a gigantic task of weeding the collection both at the Hathaway Library in Assonet and the James White Library in East Freetown, both collections had gone untouched for many years. This project is necessary to make room for new materials that have been purchased and also to keep the collections current. We are disposing of materials that haven't been used for over seven years and also materials that are outdated and worn. Due to lack of space, the collections in both libraries had grown out onto the floor creating a hazard for our patrons and ourselves. This task will continue far into FY17 and beyond. This task can only be done when the libraries are closed.

We received approximately \$9,858 in State Aide. If a library does not meet the amount of town appropriations set by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners, they are in danger of losing their State Aide. FY15 I am proud to say that our town met the required budget set forth by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners for the third year in a row. We should give thanks to the Town Selectmen and the Finance for making this happen and seeing the need to fully fund the library budget. Without full funding, we would lose our Certification, which means were would not have receive any State Aide and our patrons would not be allowed to borrow materials from any other library in the state, so full funding is extremely important for the people in our small community.

In FY15, the budget was spent on salaries, books, audio books, magazines, DVDs, compact discs, e-books, newspapers, park and museum passes, network membership, software, hardware, large print books, children's books, electricity, phone, heat, building maintenance, etc. The library spent \$30,590 on library materials, keeping our libraries up to date with current materials and filling the requests of our patrons.

<u>Buildings/Grounds</u>: We would like to thank the Building Commissioner Scott Barbato for the maintenance that he and his crew provide at the Hathaway Library in Assonet and the White Library in East Freetown. The White Library is privately owned and overseen by the Building Trustees. Due limited funds and lack of volunteers, they are unable to keep up the grounds at the White Library. The Freetown Highway Department works and Scott Barbato have stepped forward and helped out greatly by taking care of the grounds. We would like to thank Chuck Macomber and his crew for their help. We also wish to thank the members of the East Freetown Congregational Christian Church, who generously allow us to use their parking lot and who plowed the lot throughout the winter.

Senior Librarian Althea Brady uses her knowledge of reference, the community, and circulation services for the benefit of our library patrons. Her dedication to both The Hathaway and The White Library does not go unnoticed or unappreciated. She is also a very active member of the Friends of the Library, putting in many volunteer hours to organize and work at the semi-annual book sales as well as any other project/program to support the library. Casey Pittsley along with me constitutes our entire Technical Services staff and we have all of the responsibility for cataloging our library materials, at times this is an overwhelming task but they are always able to get everything accomplished. Mary Ouimet has been with us for a number of years through the Senior Volunteer Program. Mary Ouimet is an asset to the library. She has been willing to fill in when we are shorthanded, which is often. She goes above and beyond of what is expected from her. We unofficially consider Mrs. Ouimet a member of our staff. Every staff member has to be willing to multi-task and be knowledgeable about library services, automated circulation, interlibrary loan, and delivery procedures. They must also be willing to be flexible with the hours that they are needed to work. It

is impossible to enumerate all of the things that these dedicated, talented women do for the library, but we do know that they are appreciated by the Trustees and by the residents of Freetown and by the Library Director.

<u>Following is the report of the Historical Commission for the period July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015.</u> The Freetown Historical Commission, the town appointed board continues works to protect and preserve historic structures and landmarks.

The FHC has remained persistent in its efforts to preserve and rehabilitate the structures and sites in the town of Freetown, especially town owned buildings. The first phase of the restoration of Assonet Village School circa 1794 is an example of such efforts with the assistance of a Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund Emergency Grant by Secretary of State William F. Galvin's office towards emergency repairs to the Village School, and additional funds be provided by the residents of Freetown. Mr. Charles VanDoorhis of New Bedford was the selected architect. The progress was reported in last year's town report. The Historical Commission serves to encourage preservation and attends workshops to be better prepared to serve as resource for the community.

A Needs and Space Study of all Municipal Offices, Police, the Council on Aging and the Library was completed by Architectural Consulting Group, LLC. A report was presented to residents at an open meeting included considerations and uses for the town historic buildings. The Town Building Committee was formed with appointed representatives from boards, staff, and includes a representative from the Historical Commission will serve on this committee. We look forward to participating to improve the town buildings and utilizing our historic properties to serve some of the needs of the community.

<u>Demolition Delay By-Law</u>: Following the procedures of the Demolition Delay By Law for properties of historic age, the Freetown Historical Commission was required to make a determination of a demolition request for a house at 150 South Main Street circa 1889, that had been purchased by Stop and Shop, LLC All members of FHC visited and viewed the house. Although the original structure was at least 100 years old, it showed evidence of numerous alterations. Photographs were taken of the interior with its gracious stairway, period doors, and woodwork. Various exterior views of the house were also photographed to record historic evidence of this structure which will be including in our files to denote that it was part of Freetown's history. The FHC did not oppose the granting the demolition permit for the house at 150 South Main Street with specific conditions as part of the agreement.

Freetown Historical Commission participated at FHC participated at the Freetown Historical Society's Annual Open House and the Tuesday Club informational meeting on the Bio reserve and how it effects Freetown. We also are working with others over the concerns at Profile Rock and the Hathaway Cemetery.

The Freetown Historical Commission was pleased to welcome new member, Nicole Bruno, who was appointed by the Board of Selectman.

### **REPORT OF THE FREETOWN PLANNING BOARD**

The Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown,

Following is the report of the Planning Board for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015.

During this fiscal year the Planning Board endorsed 11 Form A Approval Not Required under Subdivision Control plans resulting in the creation of 27 lots. The Planning Board collected \$2700.00 in filing fees. The Board reviewed 2 Special Permits for new signs, resulting in \$540.00 in fees. The Board reviewed 1 special permit and 1 site plan review project resulting in the collection of \$200.00 in filing fees. A total of \$11,440.47 in engineering review fees was collected for various projects.

During FY 15, the Board held public hearings to review articles related to changes to the Floodplain Overlay District Bylaw as well the Board of Selectmen's article for a Science & Technology Overlay District zoning change that was approved at the Special Town Meeting.

A technical assistance grant from South Coast Rail was awarded to the Town for FY14. The \$7,000 award allowed for SRPEDD to assist the Board on refining the Rules and Regulations for the Planned Mixed Use District (PMUD) to include provisions for the Transfer of Development Rights. The Board also received \$15,000 in District Local Technical Assistance (DLTA) funds to begin the process of revising the Rules & Regulations governing subdivisions.

Planning Board members serving during FY15 include Chairman Robert Raymond (2016), Vice-Chairman Keven Desmarais (2017), Mark Rogers (2015), Robert Jose (2018) and Nicolas Velozo (2019). Debra Robbins served as the Associate Member.

At the end of FY 15, Chairman Raymond resigned from the Board after sixteen years of service. The Board wishes to express their deepest gratitude for his years of service and dedication to the Town of Freetown, and leadership of this Board.

### **REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Freetown:

Following is the report of the Conservation Commission for the fiscal year July 1, 2014, through June 30, 2015.

The role of the Conservation Commission is to protect the wetland areas within the town. The commission reviews and, if appropriate, approves plans for any work that is contemplated either in or within 100 feet of wetlands. This approval process is to ensure that all work conducted within or near wetlands resource areas will not have a detrimental effect on the wetlands. Wetlands serve to provide storm and flood protection, pollution control, and habitats for various species of plants and animals. Groundwater also replenishes the wells that many residents rely on for water, and as such it is extremely important that residents feel free to contact the Conservation Commission if they feel that a project may be endangering wetlands.

The Conservation Commission has over 250 acres of land received through gifts from the townspeople over the years. Ownership by the commission ensures that the property is available for all to enjoy while simultaneously protecting any wetlands that may be on it.

Meetings of the Conservation Commission are held at the Town Hall in Assonet on the first and third Mondays of each month at 7:00 p.m. Our office is open Mondays and Tuesdays from 12:00 noon to 4:00 p.m.

### REPORT TO THE TOWN OF FREETOWN FROM THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SRPEDD)

The Town of Freetown is a member of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is the regional agency serving twenty-seven cities and towns in southeastern Massachusetts dealing with common issues facing our region, such as economic development, growth and land development, transportation, environment, municipal partnerships, and general planning for the future. SRPEDD is governed by a Commission of local mayors, selectmen, planning board members and at large members. We are funded by federal and state grants and local assessments. For 2015 the Town of Freetown paid \$1,505.33 to SRPEDD, based upon an assessment of 16.971 cents per capita.

Local citizens serving at SRPEDD included the following:

SRPEDD Commission: Jack Healey and Lauren Moreau Joint Transportation Planning Group: Jack Healey

Technical assistance was provided to the Town in the following areas:

- Assisted the town with an update of its Site Plan Review bylaw and development of Site Plan Review rules and regulations. (DLTA)
- Participated in an advisory capacity with the study of the Rattlesnake Brook Dam Removal. (NOAA/DER/TNC)
- Assisted Freetown with the Stream Continuity Program assessing the barriers to flows and fish passage created by bridges and culverts. (MassDOT)

Some of SRPEDD's more significant accomplishments during 2015 were:

- SRPEDD's Municipal Partnership Program continued its efforts to help improve municipal operating efficiencies and save money for residents of member cities and towns. This year the Community Electricity Aggregation program was implemented in 19 communities and should protect residents from winter spikes in their electricity bill and could save the region over \$15M the first winter. The Group bid for EMS (ambulance) supplies was expanded to include up to 188 communities including cities and towns supported by other RPA's.
- The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), which sets regional priorities for federal transportation funds, was completed and approved for FY 2016-2019. The TIP targets apply to highway projects, and transit funds for GATRA and SRTA. TIP highway targets average about \$18 million/year.
- Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for Southeastern Massachusetts, a regional economic development strategy, was completed and certified by the U.S. Economic Development Administration, making the region eligible for federal economic development grants from EDA.
- The Taunton River was designated by the US National Park Service as a Wild and Scenic River in 2009. The Taunton River Stewardship Council (TRSC) made up of locally appointed representatives from the ten municipalities abutting the Taunton River, along with supporting agencies, continues to meet regularly at SRPEDD to address protection of the river and its

outstanding natural resources. SRPEDD staff works with TRSC to administer a mini-grant program that has funded over \$120,000 in local river and tributary related projects to date.

- South Coast Rail remained a major priority in 2015. SRPEDD continued to support the Southeastern Massachusetts Commuter Rail Task Force, which includes representation from SRPEDD municipalities and regional organizations.
- SRPEDD also provided technical assistance to communities through seventeen projects that implement the South Coast Rail Economic Development and Land Use Corridor Plan. Projects included zoning bylaw amendments, community build-out analysis, with developing planning documents and renderings of possible future development under project proposals.
- SRPEDD continued as the designated sub-fiduciary agent to the Metropolitan Area Planning Council and the Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security (EOPSS) for the Southeast Regional Homeland Security Advisory Council serving 96 communities and the Wampanoag Nation in 6 counties in southeastern Massachusetts. The Council has been awarded more than \$27.5 million in federal homeland security funds since 2004.
- SRPEDD worked with 23 communities of which 19 were SRPEDD communities to create a regional aggregation of residential and small business customers for a single electricity bid. The result will provide stable electric bills over a 2 year period and is expected to save individual accounts over \$100 per year, representing a regional economic stimulus of over \$15M per year.
- SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program (including speed surveys and vehicle classification, and 38 intersection turning movement counts) and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data throughout the region. SRPEDD undertook 144 traffic counts at various locations this past year.
- An extensive Geographic Information System (GIS) mapping program is maintained by SRPEDD. Every year new computerized "data layers" are added to the system
- SRPEDD operates the Southeastern Massachusetts Data Center, providing information to businesses, cities and towns, and individuals.
- SRPEDD provides technical planning to two regional transit authorities, SRTA and GATRA, including: route evaluations, rider surveys, performance standards and federal reporting. SRPEDD completed a Regional Transit Plan for GATRA that will guide transit improvements in the near future. SRPEDD also began an extensive inventory and assessment of all bus stops located on fixed routes within the GATRA and SRTA areas. This work will continue in 2016.
- SRPEDD maintains a comprehensive database of all 365 signalized intersections in the region. This includes geometry, traffic volume, crash rate, signal timing and operational characteristics.
- SRPEDD continued its affiliation with the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion.

SRPEDD was created to serve the cities and towns of southeastern Massachusetts. We are governed by elected and appointed officials from all the cities and towns. We look forward to serving you in the future.

### **APPONEQUET REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL**

Enrollment as of June 2015 was Grade 9 - 192 students, Grade 10 - 162 students, Grade 11 – 187 students, Grade 12 - 203 students for a total of seven hundred and forty four (744) students enrolled at Apponequet Regional High School. The **Class of 2015** graduated on Friday, June 5, 2015, on Griffith Field at 6:00 pm. The graduates, consisting of one hundred and ninety-eight (198) students who attained one hundred and ten (110) credits and met MA competancy via MCAS, were led by Class Valedictorian, Nathaniel Silvia, Class Salutatorian, Hannah Nelson, and Class President, Colin McGurk. The Charge to the Class was delivered by Amy Sullivan. Post-graduation, one Hundred (125) twenty-five students headed off to four year colleges and fifty-nine (59) to two year colleges and technical schools. Four (4) members of the class intended to proudly serve in the military and ten (10) students entered the workforce.

Previous to commencement, on June 2, 2015, ARHS held its annual **Senior Awards Night** in the Robert Falcon Auditorium. Local scholarships were awarded to approximately 110 members of the Class of 2015. The Scholarship Committee thanked all of our local organizations for donating over \$130,000 to the Class of 2015.

One hundred and seventy-two (172) Class of 2015 members took the **SATs**. Mean scores were: Critical Reading, 523; Math, 523; and Writing, 504. In May of 2015, **Advanced Placement** (AP) exams were administered in fourteen (14) different subject areas: Biology, Calculus, Chemistry, Computer Science, English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition, Environmental Science, European History, French, Physics, Psychology, Studio Art, Spanish Language, and US History. Of the two-hundred and seventy (270) exams administered, one hundred and fifty-four (154) were scored as a "3", "4" or "5". Those scores qualified students for advanced standing or college level credit at most colleges and universities.

The **Core Values and Beliefs Committee** voted and implemented a new statement of values and beliefs to replace the previous Mission Statement. The new Core Values and Beliefs were/are as follows. School-wide rubrics will be developed in the 2015-2016 year. Achievement: We will empower all members of the school community to work hard to attain success. Resilience: We will foster a learning environment in which all members of the school are encouraged to be strong in the face of challenge and to persevere. Honor: We will promote and encourage positive behavior, accountability, and respect for oneself, for others, and for our school. Self-Advocacy: We will encourage all members of the school community to identify their educational strengths, advocate for their needs, and support their own intellectual curiosity.

We were honored to host Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy. During his visit, the Congressman spoke of the importance of financial literacy and college planning to students. The Congressman was joined by Ms. Geraldine Shea of RBS Wealth Management. ARHS was also pleased to host visits from Massachusetts Secretary of Education Dr. Matthew Malone and Senator Michael J. Rodrigues. Students in a mixed grade 11 and 12 Government class asked rigorous questions and engaged both gentlemen in discussion about education, as well as other relevant matters. Dr. Malone encouraged the group to attend Massachusetts Colleges and Universities and to give back to its communities by remaining in Massachusetts.

The **Guidance Department**, under the supervision of Mrs. Paula Money, 6-12 Guidance Department Head, added the LifeLines Suicide prevention program to its curriculum. This program included parent/guardian, staff, and student training. The Department also hosted several parent/guardian events such as the Caring for our Community Members Nights and College Financial Assistance Night. College Fairs occured throughout the month of October and the Department organized and executed four (4) Career Panels throughout the months of January and February. Many local professionals and graduates volunteered to speak to our students about the importance of high school decision making and future plans. College visit field trips to BCC and the colleges of the Fenway occured. An internship with Officer Ryan Maltais, our SRO, was approved and began with its first group of six students.

The **English Department** (ELA) consisted of eight (8) teachers during the 2014-2015 school year. In addition to meeting the needs of the four (4) year ELA requirement, semester electives in Creative Writing and Horror Fiction were offered. The ELA Department, a Department that incurred a .6 reduction in staff in 2012, has made many significant gains despite that reduction but continues to seek reinstatement of the .6 in order to increase elective and remedial offerings.

The ELA MCAS was administered in March 2015 to one hundred and fifty-three (153) students. Ninety-eight percent (98%) of students received a score designated as Advanced or Proficient. Specifically, 69% were Advanced, which is a 24% increase from the previous year, 29% Proficient, and 1% Needs Improvement, which is a 1% decrease from 2014. There were no failures. One percent (1%) was labeled as Warning due to the ongoing portfolio work for the alternate exam. ELA teachers utilized Common Planning Time (CPT) to create activities and assessments aimed at increasing the students' writing and "open response" scores. They also completed an item analysis of last year's MCAS test that drove their writing goals for the year. These efforts were successful. Not only did the students' scores increase overall, more specifically, each open response average score increased from the previous year.

The ELA AP courses, AP Language and Composition and AP Literature and Composition, continued to be popular choices for students seeking the challenge of college coursework and the potential for college credit. Seventy-seven percent (77%) of the seventy five (75) students who took one of the AP ELA courses received a qualifying score on the College Board AP Exam. The Department coordinated efforts to promote the AP courses for the next school year and, as a result, approximately one hundred (100) students have enrolled in AP English for the 2015-2016 school year, a 25% increase.

In an effort to increase the importance placed on literacy, several school-wide literacy events were created. All 12th grade ELA students read *The Last Lecture* by Randy Pausch and participated in the first "Community Read" event. In total, one hundred and ninety (190) students, twenty-five (25) staff members and seventeen (17) community members came together in May to discuss the book and to share advice. In addition, the Summer Reading Program was revised to include a "One Book, One School" initiative. All students read *The Day the World Came to Town*, by Jim Defede, and participated in similar activities to begin their ELA classes in 2015. Teachers in other subject areas were also invited to read the book and many executed cross-curricular activities.

The ELA Department continued its tradition of submitting student writing samples to Middlebury College's New England Young Writers' Conference. Judges from the collegiate level selected Maddie Hallam and Leah Berbine to attend this prestigious conference in May. In addition, several AP English Language students received recognition for their submissions to the "Letters About Literature" competition. Both Kevin Arnold and Cameron Shippee were invited to the State House to receive their awards. Brittany Tainsh and Allison Mello both received Honorable Mention certificates. Daebreon Henry was also a finalist in a contest sponsored by the MA Treasury Department on the Wage Gap. Lastly, the following 12th grade students received the ELA Book Award at the Senior Awards Night: Allison Conefrey, Corinne Jones, Sarah Meleski, David Reed, Lauren Tavares, and Dan Zajac.

Teachers organized and provided many field trip opportunities to expose students to culture, the arts, and even the outdoors in consort with the curriculum. Many 10th grade students attended the *Of Mice and Men* theater performance, while 12th grade students attended a performance of *Hamlet*. Creative Writing and 12th grade students went hiking in the Blue Hills in connection to *The Girl Who Loved Tom Gordon* by Stephen King. Finally, 10th grade students who read *The* 

*Great Gatsby* explored Rosecliff Mansion in Newport, RI. FLRSD employee James Rollins and Fall River Police Detective Matthew Silvia spoke to grade 12 students regarding Vietnam and service in Iraq, respectively, in conjunction with *The Things They Carried*.

A formal textbook review was completed by the ELA teachers and a new textbook series was selected to replace the current literature books in grades 9-11. Grade 9 textbooks will be replaced for the next school year. The new textbooks are aligned to the Common Core, provide differentiated reading selections, include multimedia presentations, and are available online.

The **World Language Department** consisted of six (6) full time teachers. Mrs. Ashley Emery, an ARHS graduate, joined the Department. It was the first year the World Language Department offered AP Spanish and AP French. The school does not have the language lab capabilities recommended for an AP language course but a free recording program called Audacity was downloaded on every computer in one computer lab. Using the technology and resources available, the AP exam was administered. Students have signed up for both AP Spanish and AP French for the 2015-2016 year. The decision was also made, during the 2014-2015 school year, to add a two year World Language requirement for graduation, beginning with the Class of 2019.

The Department continued to work on the creation of common assignments and assessments. The teachers worked together to ensure consistency in all of the classrooms. After having collaboratively developed a presentation rubric and used this rubric at least once per quarter in every course, members reviewed and analyzed results. In addition, the Department continued working on curriculum maps and UBD units in all courses.

After a successful first experience, Marie Hartley, French teacher, ran the American Field Services (AFS) group. We proudly hosted five (5) students. Ana Lopez, from Mexico, Hauruka Maeyama, from Japan, Ka Hei Mak, from Hong Kong, Kateryna Solodvnyk, from Ukraine, and Alicia Hecker, from Germany, all enjoyed their year long experience. AFS members began organizing our second International Exchange Program experience. As a result, in 2016, a group of twenty-four (24) students and two (2) teachers will embark on Apponequet's second ever school-to-school exchange with the Lycée Hilaire de Chardonnet in Chalon sur Saône in the Burgundy region of France. Students will stay with the families of the students they hosted in the Fall. In addition to attending classes, the week in Chalon will be full of excursions. The exchange will end with a visit to Paris. Much of the 2014-2015 year was spent making preparations.

During the 2014-2015 school year, the **History and Social Studies Department** participated in numerous annual traditions from Constitution Day to visits to the JFK Library. For more than twenty-five (25) years, in coordination with the East Freetown VFW Post 6643, the History and Social Studies Department participated in the national Voice of Democracy competition. More than one hundred (100) students performed their speeches and this year's winners received a combined \$1,000 in prizes awarded by Post 6643. Winners were Jordan Sferazza (1<sup>st</sup>), Charlotte Corriveau (2<sup>nd</sup>), and Abigail Keith (3<sup>rd</sup>). VFW Post 6643 also continued to fund the senior Social Studies Awards to four deserving seniors awarded each June.

The Department celebrated National History Day. This year, participation extended to all grade 9 honors classes. A total of seventy-seven (77) students, including many upperclassmen, voluntarily participated. Fourteen (14) students advanced to the state level. One (1) project, focused on James "Whitey" Bulger, gained national attention. Mr. Robert Powers also chaired our Annual Government Day in April at the Massachusetts State House. Two (2) students, Abby Carchio and Caitlin Rowley, were student representatives.

The Department continued to work on UBD curriculum units in the areas of World History II, United States History I, and United States History II. Members developed common performance tasks, assessments and writing rubrics. The Department continued to offer new electives for the 2014-15 school year including Government, Psychology, Sociology, and AP Psychology. The Department's electives served more than five hundred and fifty (550) students, both juniors and seniors. A visit from the MA Secretary of Education was a highlight of the year.

Stacey Rousseau, an ARHS Class of 2002 graduate, was hired as a member of the **Mathematics Department** in July 2014 to replace Mary Tamucci who retired in June 2014. There were 8.2 teachers in the Department. The results of the 2015 MCAS were as follows: 70% scored Advanced, 20% scored Proficient, 7% scored Needs Improvement and 3% scored Warning. Professional Development days and departmental meetings were used to review and analyze data from year-long DDMs, review and utilize the scoring rubric in Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II and Precalculus, and to engage in the textbook review and adoption process. At the conclusion of the year, the Department selected new texts for a number of courses and had those texts approved by School Committee.

During 2014-2015, the ARHS **Science Department** was productive. The Department welcomed Mrs. Breana Accardi and Mr. Michael Pollino. Both replaced Chemistry teachers who saught employment elsewhere. The Department also welcomed Mr. Jonathan Kelley as a Physics teacher who replaced Dr. Andrew Meade. The June 2015 MCAS results for Biology were strong with 79% of students scoring Advanced or Proficient, 16.4% Needs Improvement and 4.6% Warning. Students taking Biology during the 2015-2016 school year will take the Biology MCAS in June 2016 and learn of their scores in the Fall of 2016.

The Science Department worked on revising curriculum to meet the new Science State Standards. Members continued to update and use the departmental wide DMMs that measured student growth in the area of science writing. Furthermore, each teacher developed additional DDMs that measured student growth within the content area. Teachers worked during CPT to write curriculum for our elective courses and to explore different inquiry-based teaching instructions for implementation in our classroom. The addition of inquiry-based teaching strategies continues to be a departmental wide goal.

In May, 2015, the Science Department held its annual Science Awards Ceremony to recognize top science students in each course. The ceremony was held in the library and both students and parents/guardians attended. Each science teacher handed out certificates and pins to the top students in each of their courses. Awards were also given to students who received 5s on their science AP exam from the previous school year. In all, more than forty-five (45) students were honored at this event.

In addition to the Science Awards Ceremony, the Science Department gave out awards at the Senior Awards Night in June 2015. The awards were certificates of recognition from the Boston chapter of the Society of Women Engineers, the Bausch and Lomb Scholarship for the University of Rochester, the Rensselaer Medal with a scholarship to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and our annual Senior Science Award, given to the senior who has shown great achievement in his/her science classes, a high interest in the sciences and a desire to continue studying science in college.

The **Visual Arts Department** experienced a year full of exciting opportunities and achievements. Junior Mallory McPhee was chosen through an application process to participate in the Teen Artist Internship program sponsored by Artworks! and the New Bedford Art Museum. Mallory met with a mentor artist on a weekly basis for several weeks and created original artwork that was featured in a culminating art exhibit. Three (3) grade 12 students earned a total of five (5) awards from the Boston Globe Scholastics Art & Writing Awards. Katie Motta received a Gold Key Award for a painting she created of a fall still life. Her painting was included in an exhibit at Boston University for Gold Key Award recipients. Joshua Correira received a Silver Key Award for his computer

generated logo design. Danielle Simpkin was awarded Honorable Mention Awards for three of her illustrations.

The following Visual Arts students participated in an art exhibit held at the Great Ponds Gallery at the Lakeville Library: Joshua Correira, Danielle Simpkin, Melissa Hacunda, Kelsie Fiola, Katie Motta, Mateus Felipe, Morgan Wynne, Corinne Jones, Brittany Cochran, Olivia Gilliland, Felisa Garate, Harrison McGuire, Andrea Cambra, Julia Cambra, Emma Fallo and Alex Inacio. In January, 2015, students in the Digital Art & Photography, Art III, and AP Studio Art classes participated in an exhibit at the Freetown Historical Society Museum. They presented artwork in a variety of media that celebrated the history of their families, cultures, and communities.

In April, 2015, the Visual Arts Department held the 2nd Annual Apponequet Regional High School Art Exhibit, in which students from the Art I, Art II, Art III & IV, AP Studio Art, and Digital Art and Photography classes exhibited work in a variety of media. An opening reception was held to welcome family and community members.

Continuing with the art student's achievements, Junior Leah Berbine was chosen by application process and interview to participate in Art All State sponsored by UMASS Dartmouth during the month of May. This opportunity allowed her a pre-college experience where she spent a weekend working with mentor artists and other student artists from cities and towns throughout the Commonwealth. She studied works of art in the museum's collection, participated in group discussions with professional artists and collaborated with other students on three-dimensional art installations around a particular theme.

The **Business/Technology Department's** personnel remained constant at 2.0. Mrs. Maria Bernard, a teacher from FLMS replaced Mr. Frank Tarnapol as a result of a restructure at FLMS. There was a 1.0 reduction in Business/Technology staff at ARHS in 2012 and continued to result in offering less technology courses.

The Department continued to update its Freshmen Seminar curriculum to include Life Lines Suicide Prevention (in conjunction with Guidance) instruction and Digital Citizenry instruction. The Department's highly successful and popular DECA organization had over 180 high school students that participated in various district, state and international competitions and conferences. Students attended numerous DECA events including DECA Day at the Red Sox, Power Trip Leadership conference in Boston, and Group presentations with Wilmington DECA at Patriot Hall. Students also participated in the Stock Market Game and earned awards in Boston.

Students in the Department also experienced numerous learning opportunities/ support from outside organizations. Junior Achievement offered the Titan Challenge at UMASS Dartmouth. Piper Jaffray presented their Taking Stock with teens Program. Students participated in the International Economic summit, The Euro Challenge and The Larry Summers Presentation sponsored by MCEE at the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston.

The **Health Department** remained at a 1.0 staff. Students spent their semesters covering topics such as Alcohol, Drugs, Interpersonal Relationships and Nutrition. Plans began to integrate Health and P.E. into a Wellness curriculum for the 2015-2016 school year.

Performing ensembles in the **Music Department** had another busy year. The Band, Choir, Select Choirs, and Jazz Ensemble represented our school at over 20 public performances. Of particular note was the appearance of the Marching Band at the Veterans' Day parades in Norton and Fairhaven, MA. The Norton School Music program had been re-building after years of reductions and were not able to provide a band for the town's event. The members of the Apponequet Band were happy to provide this service to honor veterans. Faculty members were: Edward Ledwith-

Band and Dennis Robinson-Choir. Nine Band members represented ARHS at the third annual High School HONOR Band Festival, held at Bridgewater State University. Student participants were: Rachel Belanger, Jason Carmichael, Kelly Emerson, Sarah Eugenio, Nicholas Matson, Abigail Keith, Colin McGurk, Cameron Roberts, and Hailey Streeto. The day consisted of rehearsals with music students from several other high schools, under the direction of university-level conductors, and concluded with a concert in the evening.

The combined Music Departments of ARHS and Freetown-Lakeville Middle School presented their annual "Music In Our Schools Night" in the FLMS Auditorium. Choral and vocal groups from each of the schools performed; the combined MS/HS Bands performed a selection, as did the combined MS/HS Choirs. The directors at both schools were grateful for parents' support of their children's musical interests. Plans to include a Music Appreciation class took shape throughout the year.

The Apponequet **Library** was an active place of learning. Student artwork and projects were displayed in the art gallery and along the shelves. The Library was visited by approximately 23,100 students over the course of the year who worked on projects, researched and read. The number of teachers and students utilizing the resources in the library continued to grow. Students enjoyed using the Wi-Fi with their personal devices. The library again hosted "National History Day" competition and the Art show. In addition, the library played host to our Community Reads event and the annual Science Department Awards.

The **Physical Education Department** welcomed Ms. Tracy Cabral, a teacher from FLMS who transferred to a position, previously held by Mr. Jon Stapleton, at ARHS. The Department was proud to present the annual Physical Education Sportsmanship Award to two graduating seniors at the Senior Awards night in June. The two recipients demonstrated leadership, sportsmanship and effort. The recipients were Elise Arsenault and Benjamin Paquette. As previously noted, plans began to integrate Health and P.E. into a Wellness curriculum for the 2015-2016 school year.

The Apponequet **Athletic Department** remained a member of the South Coast Conference and competed with area schools such as: Bourne, Case, Dighton - Rehoboth, Fairhaven, Greater New Bedford. Voc. Tech., Old Rochester, Seekonk, and Wareham. We offered twenty-four (24) Varsity sports that consist of forty-one (41) teams with the various Freshmen, J.V. and Varsity levels. We had three distinct seasons, Fall, Winter and Spring. Congratulations to the following teams for winning the South Coast Conference Championship during the 2014-15 academic year: Football, Girl's Soccer, Field Hockey, Boy's Swimming , Girl's Swimming, Girls Tennis, Girls Lacrosse, and Boy's Lacrosse.

We boasted five hundred and forty-five (545) total athletic participants. Three Hundred Twenty-Two (322) students participated in at least one (1) sport. This was an excellent ratio of participation. We encourage our students to participate in multiple sports. We are well within the limits of a 5% ratio for female and male sports compared to the school population for Title IX concerns. Our athletes earned many All Conference awards as well as sportsmanship and honorable mention awards.

Unfortunately, Apponequet entered its sixth year with an athletic user fee. We assessed our athletes the following annual user fee.

First Sport - \$300.00 Second Sport - \$150.00 Third Sport - \$0.00 Family cap in an academic year - \$1,000.00

This Athletic User Fee generated approximately \$145,000.00 and directly supplemented the regional school budget. The athletic user fee did not pay all the operational costs accrued during

the athletic seasons. It was also brought forward to the Regional School Committee that the tennis courts and the track were in severe need of repairs. The decision was made to address matters. The courts were scheduled to be completely refurbished and a new track was to be installed. Both projects were scheduled for Summer 2015. A third concern, the pool, located at GRAIS, remained. This concern will be shared with the Regional School Committee during the 2015-2016 school year.

In addition to our athletic user fees, parents/guardians continued to support our students. The parent booster groups at Apponequet include the Music Boosters, the Athletic Boosters, the Football Grid Iron Club, and the Laker Hockey Club.

In addition to participation in sports, more than seven hundred (700) students participated in **clubs**, **activities**, **and school-sponsored events**. Some (but not limited to) of the **Annual Events/Fundraisers** that took place at Apponequet Regional High School or that students and staff participated in were as follows:

**Fundraisers**: Monster Movie Matinee (month of October), Fall, Winter & Last-of-the-School-Year Coffeehouse, Agenda Book Sale, Cookie Dough Sale, English Class Blue Hills Hike, Class Tee-Shirts, Calendar Sale, Food Drive, Coat Drive, Can Drive, Conditioning Clinic, Otis Spunkmeyer, Popcorn & Little Caesar's sale, Christmas Tree & Easter Plant sale, Comedy Shows, Gift Card Fundraiser, and multiple car washes.

**Events**: Band Camp, 9<sup>th</sup> Grade Orientation, "Welcome Back to School" Dance, Homecoming Dance, Jr.-Sr. Prom, Ring Dance, Day of Silence, Put-A-Cap on Name Calling Day, Diversity Senior Awards Banquet, several Math Team Meets, Taunton & Middleboro Christmas Parades, Winter & Spring Concerts, Fall Play & Spring Musical, New Student Orientation, Coffee with the Principal (several), Showcase Night, College Fairs, Laker Choice Awards, Gong Show, Parent/Teacher Night, Parent/Teacher Afternoon, AFS Foreign Exchange Student Weekend, College Planning Seminar, Financial Aide Night, Caring for our Community Members Night(s), Distracted Driving Simulation, 2nd Annual Art Show, Science Awards, Jr. Parent Breakfast, Laker Day all sport teams have end-of-year banquets and Graduation.

We welcomed a number of new staff members in various areas. Mrs. Kahlan Dessert, ARHS graduate and Social Studies Curriculum Leader, assumed the role of Assistant Principal. Mrs. Dessert replaced Mr. Ben Janulewicz who accepted a position at a school closer to his residence. In addition, Mr. John E. Higgins joined us as a .8 Assistant Principal replacing Dr. David Worthly who saught employment elsewhere. Mr. Robert Appleyard, Mr. Joel Hoffman, Miss Michelle Jacobs, Ms. Jennifer Lalli, and Mrs. Gina Muse all joined the Special Education to replace teachers who had retired or saught employment elsewhere. Mr. Marc Stapleton assumed the role of mobility assistant vacated by Mr. Matthew Blackwell.

A number of staff members achieved recognition during the 2014-2015 school year. Mr. Robert Powers received the Henry Sullivan Student Council Advisor of the Year Award. Mrs. Michelle Pacelli and Mrs. Melanie Silva, to note two, received their Masters Degrees. SRO Ryan Maltais was honored with an Exceptional Service Award from the Massachusetts Juvenile Police Officers Association. Mrs. Bonnie Ferreira and Mrs. Carol Hulton gained recognition for their 5 yearcommitment to our VHS program.

### FREETOWN-LAKEVILLE MIDDLE SCHOOL ANNUAL TOWN REPORT FOR 2014-2015

#### Enrollment

The total enrollment at Freetown-Lakeville Middle School was 754.

#### Personnel

The following staff members retired in June after many years in the district: Nancy Annichiarico (37 years) and Sandra Cates (23 years).

#### MCAS

The summary of the results of our Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) indicated that in English Language Arts, 80% of our 6th students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 67.5, 76% of our 7th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 41, and 90% of our 8th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 41, and 90% of our 8th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 60. In mathematics 74% of our 6th students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 45, 55% of our 7th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 47, and 69% of our 8th grade students scored at the proficient level or higher and had a student growth percentile of 47 on the eighth grade science assessment, 51% of the students scored in the proficient or higher range.

#### **Charitable Work**

Freetown-Lakeville Middle School continued its annual participation in the "Pennies" fundraiser. For the ninth year, students and staff donated their spare change to support the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, which is the world's largest voluntary health organization dedicated to funding blood cancer research and providing education and patient services. The goal of the program is not only to raise money for research and patient services, but also to teach children about blood cancers, philanthropy, team work, and helping those who are less fortunate. In 2014, we raised \$2,779.39. Collectively, we have raised over \$40,000.

#### **Friends of Rachel**

The 2014-2015 Friends of Rachel (F.O.R.) group had a total of 134 members from the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade classes. Each student helped spread the message of kindness and compassion throughout our school and worked to promote our core values of respect, responsibility, and resilience through multiple student initiatives that focused on helping others and teaching tolerance.

The F.O.R. group, once again, ran several drives in support of families in need, animal welfare, and our troops.

#### **Teams and Clubs**

In addition to competitive boys' and girls' basketball team, many students participated in our co-ed soccer team, the band, the choirs, majorettes, the art club, school council, the yearbook club, and a creative writing club.

#### NJHS

The National Junior Honor Society had 73 members who maintained a high GPA while engaging in school and community service projects. The scholars' community service work included recycling, serving as library aids, and providing assistance for the non-profit organizations. Students also completed individual community service projects outside of school.

### PCC

We also had 18 eighth students attend Project Contemporary Competitiveness (PCC) at Stonehill College. PCC provides an intellectually enriching and socially stimulating residential summer program over the course of six weeks.

#### The Fine Arts

"The Little Mermaid" was the play performed by our drama club. The cast and crews consisted of over 65 students and were under the direction of our music teachers, Mrs. Blell and Mr. Johnson.

#### Library/Media Services

The school library and its staff continued to be a wonderful resource for the students and staff with a total of 14,597 in materials available. The annual total of library materials circulated was 8,675 and the total of student visits to the library was 17,923.

Enrollment figures for 2014 were 215 for the 4<sup>th</sup> Grade and 235 for the 5<sup>th</sup> Grade.

Over the past year, the George R. Austin Intermediate School (GRAIS) has undertaken a lot of changes to create a professional learning community where the staff has been working significantly on aligning curriculum to the Common Core standards and creating a consistent delivery of instruction for all students. As our MCAS data has been instrumental in driving our school improvement plan goals, we have linked our growth to MCAS data and are confident that we will see significant growth in the spring of 2016.

Each grade level has their strengths and area of improvement. We have sat as teams and identified these areas as outlined in our school improvement plan. The grade 4 ELA team has shown some significant struggles in the long composition that students are required to write. As a result, the teachers have been working with the literacy coaches to implement a Writer's Workshop model in their classrooms that takes place daily for 40 minutes. This year they have gone a step further and are focusing on the conferring part of the writer's workshop where teachers sit with students for periods of three to five minutes and individual conferences take place about actual student writing pieces. Dr. Correia, the literacy coach, has modeled this skill in all classrooms. Another area identified across both grades 4 and 5 was student's response to text. Dr. Correia has also been modeling and working with teachers around this skill as the main focus for 2015 - 2016.

The grade 4 and 5 math teams have similar goals around becoming acclimated with the new math program that was purchased, Ready Math. This is year 2 of the program and teachers meet daily to plan, review and analyze data to create lessons and interventions for students. Each teacher has also created a half an hour math intervention block 3 times per week into their math times.

#### Our Mission

All members of the learning community at GRAIS will work together interdependently to support each student in a collaborative, cross curricular environment to improve our individual and collective results. Teaching and learning will be based on universal grade level outcomes driven by "essential questions" that advance the curriculum toward real life applications so that the learning process becomes more relevant and meaningful. Collective data will be used to provide research based interventions for students so that all individuals in our learning community are making progress towards National and State Curriculum Standards. We will strive to do this by developing an effective Response to Intervention program that uses progress monitoring to identify individual student needs. Students will be encouraged to become life-long learners and problem solvers who can efficiently use and interpret 21st century tools, and media to seek knowledge and information that will help them to become productive members of society.

#### **PTO and School Council**

Both our PTO and School Council have been very active over the course of the year. Our PTO presented several different assemblies, including a bullying assembly and an assembly that aligned to our curriculum. This year students participated in a turkey trot, which promoted physical fitness and was run by Robin Ireland, the Physical Education Teacher, attend a trip to Gillette Stadium and participate in the Halloween social and annual Luau.

Our School Council is composed of four teachers, the principal, and one parent. The School Council assists the principal in developing the budget, creating and maintaining the annual School Improvement Plan. This year the School Council has been instrumental in the creation of a homework policy for GRAIS.

#### Academic Report

With the growing demands from the state and federal government, we are constantly striving to improve instruction. MCAS results have been analyzed from last years' grade 3 and grade 4 students and this data has been utilized to plan instruction and provide interventions to meet student need.

In addition to the initiatives mentioned above, we have engaged in the following:

#### Combining our Education Support Team and Building Based Team:

Last year we had recreated our Educational Support Team to analyze data, engage in book studies, train staff on interventions and resources, run data meetings, and progress monitoring meetings six times per year. The year started with a survey presented to staff to collect data around the needs of the staff in relation to data and planning instruction. Last year we also included math on the team due to the new math program, Ready Math, offering a data component where students are benchmarked three times a year. We have created a data room that houses the data of the students where the EST meets to continuously look at the progress students are making and recreating individual student goals. This year, we combined our building based support team with our data team. The purpose of this was due to the data team becoming so strong with implementing interventions and improving out Tier I instruction as a whole. Teachers that now have concerns with particular students are able to bring them up to our newly created team.

#### **Student Portfolios:**

All students needing intervention in the areas of math and ELA have been identified and the team of teachers have worked together to create progress portfolios on each child. These portfolios consist of intervention work samples, lesson plans and progress monitoring graphs.

#### Data and progress monitoring meetings:

Meetings have been scheduled 6 times a year. The data meetings take place after each benchmark testing (fall, winter and spring) and the progress monitoring meetings then take place in between those to continuously monitor all students identified and recreating interventions and instruction.

#### Ready Math

Last year, the fourth and fifth grade math teachers have begun a new math program titled: Ready Math. The program is aligned to the Common Core and offers several components to it including: lesson plans, interventions to fill gaps, a data warehouse, and enrichment ideas. The staff has done a fabulous job at becoming acclimated with the program as they have worked with the coaches and used release days to familiarize themselves with the program. We are continuing to grow with the program as many new components have been added to assist teachers. We continue to work with the math coach to become proficient in utilizing all the program has to offer.

#### Common Planning

The common planning times continue to be used for colleagues to meet around the above mentioned initiatives. It is done daily for 20 minutes and has been instrumental in allowing for teachers to collaborate around curriculum.

#### School Services

Our services have remained fairly constant. We currently have 3 specialists: art, gym, and music. We greatly welcome Mr. Alex Duff as our new music teacher where he has been working with

students after school to organize a fourth and fifth grade choir that performs twice a year. We enjoyed a fabulous winter concert that was performed for the school as well as for friends and families. We look forward to the spring one as well. All three of our specialists are full time specialists at GRAIS, with a half time library para – professional.

#### School Community

Some things we have engaged in as a school include our annual Turkey Trot, put on by the Physical Education teacher, Mr. Ireland, talent shows, science and heritage fairs, school dances, chorus concerts, art fair, various field trips and our annual Survivor Day. Community Involvement:

GRAIS held our first principal's coffee this year in October where the transition from grade 3 to 4 was discussed with several parents. There will 2 additional coffees this year to continue the process of working with parents to improve the school.

### FREETOWN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

#### Total Enrollment:

For the 2014-2015 academic year, Freetown Elementary School's total enrollment was 383, servicing students in Pre-Kindergarten – Grade 3. This indicates a 48-student decrease as the enrollment for 2013-2014 was 431 children. Additionally, READS Collaborative educated pre-school students with cochlea implants at FES.

#### Personnel Changes:

The 2014-2015 school year brought three new employees to FES. Danielle Moreau was hired as the new school adjustment counselor, Rachel Kravchuk as a second grade teacher and Bonnie Leite as an integrated preschool teacher. As the year concluded, Sarah Brink retired from a long and successful career at FES.

#### Staff Recognition:

FES received a \$400.00 donation from Shaw's Supermarket as part of their "We Love Our Schools" program. The funds were used to defray the costs of field trips and their related transportation costs.

Grade 3 teachers received the Yellow School Bus Grant for \$250.00 for a field trip to the New Bedford Whaling Museum as a culminating activity following the whales and whaling unit.

#### New Initiatives/Programs:

Positive Behavior Intervention and Support Program: The PBIS Steering Committee was established and worked on the creation and implementation of a school wide behavior program in an effort to improve school culture, student behavior, and common expectations. Target areas within the school were identified and behavioral expectations for those areas were established. A school wide system for acknowledging positive behaviors was then developed and whole school rewards were established to celebrate these successes.

Holiday Story Hour: A holiday story hour was held for Grade 1 students and their families. Each first grade teacher read their favorite holiday book and treated everyone to cookies and milk after the event.

Cup Stacking Night: Jill Stonehouse, FES' physical education teacher, organized a cup stacking event on World Cup Stacking Day in November. Families were invited to attend and be counted toward the world record for participation.

MCAS Nights: Third grade families were invited to attend an MCAS Reading night in January and teachers provided parents with an MCAS overview, reading comprehension and test taking strategies, and an opportunity to read and answer released MCAS questions from previous years. An MCAS Math night was held in April. Parents rotated through stations focusing on math domains and interacted with their children as they solved math problems together.

Poetry Week: Last April, FES celebrated National Poem in Your Pocket Day by holding its third annual school-wide poetry week. Poem posters decorated the hallways throughout the school. Poems were placed on the tables at lunch and throughout the week students had a different poem to read. At the end of the week, everyone came to school with a poem in their pocket that they read to others. Finally, Ms. Bailey lead the school in singing the Poem in Your Pocket song over the intercom system while teachers and students lined the hallways.

Selectman for a Day: In June, third grade students wrote an essay on why Freetown makes them proud. Winning essays were read to the Freetown Board of Selectmen at their June meeting. Students were "sworn in" as selectmen and were able to play some of the roles of the selectmen during the meeting.

Career Day: Grade 3 Career Day took place in June. Approximately ten parents volunteered to share their careers with students by talking about their jobs and creating an activity for the students.

#### MCAS Results:

Freetown Elementary School's Grade 3 students participated in Reading Comprehension and Mathematics MCAS in Spring 2015. Reading results indicate that 10% scored Advanced, 48% scored Proficient, 37% scored Needs Improvement and 6% scored Warning. Mathematics performance resulted in 23% Advanced, 36% Proficient, 33% Needs Improvement and 10% warning.

#### Special Events:

The FES Grade 3 Chorus completed their third year under the direction of FES music teacher, Carissa Sugar. Over 60 students from grade three participated in this volunteer ensemble that met for rehearsals before school weekly. The chorus put on two concerts during the 2014 - 2015 school year. The winter concert took place in December 2014 and the spring concert took place in May 2015. Also in March, the FES Chorus was asked to participate as special guests at a Providence Bruins game. Additionally, the Freetown Elementary School Music Program put on three schoolwide assemblies during the 2014 - 2015 school year. The holiday assembly featured all K – 3 students. Each grade prepared a selection in music class and performed it at the all school assembly on the last day before winter break. There was even a special surprise video presentation that delighted the students. In June, students celebrated Flag Day by sharing in an assembly that honored America by singing patriotic songs.

Food baskets were assembled and distributed to town residents for both Thanksgiving and Christmas for the 23<sup>nd</sup> consecutive year. Thanks to the generosity of FES families and staff, ten households per holiday were provided meals.

Freetown Elementary School participated in the Juvenile Diabetes Research Fund "Kids Walk to Find a Cure" and raised \$5494.00 to help cure Type 1 Diabetes.

In May 2015, a student art exhibit was held. All students, K-3, self-selected two or three of their own pieces to display. Over 1,000 pieces of art were shown and families were invited to the school to view them. The PTO provided snacks for a reception.

The Freetown Elementary School PTO has been instrumental in bringing many wonderful programs and family events to our school. They have also raised substantial funds and contributed them to the school and individual classrooms to enhance instruction and cultural experiences.

Our school motto is one that has remained grounded in our *Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports* (PBIS) program over the past two years. We depend on this initiative to be the foundation for creating a learning environment that allows all those that learn or work at AES to achieve, excel and soar.

Total enrollment for the 2014-2015 school year was 440 students (K-3), a decrease from 477 the previous year. This has been a downward trend over the past few years.

AES celebrated the many years of service that **Maria Martin** gave to Assawompset Elementary School when she retired at the end of the school. She will be remembered for her patriotic spirit, running school elections, her support of the AES PTO and being the Grand Marshall of the Kindergarten Dr. Seuss Parade.

**Doug Berry** also retired after a long tenure at AES. He has had the pleasure of teaching the children of his former students over the years. He will be remembered for his squads, stretching exercises and Mr. Berry's Fun House.

School and District Initiatives:

- Teachers began using the *Ready Math* curriculum replacing *Every Day Math. Ready Math* was written to align with the *Massachusetts Frameworks*.
- Grade 3 continued its *Walk to Read* model in its inclusion classrooms to help target instruction for all student reading levels in those rooms.
- The PBIS Committee began its second year as a school-wide initiative and supported Freetown Elementary in the first year launching their PBIS program, creating consistency between the District's two elementary schools. Highlights of the year consisted of a school-wide reward from the *Eyes' on Owls* organization. This reward was celebrated by the entire school for outstanding examples of *Safety*, *Respect* and *Responsibility*. The *Eyes on Owls* assembly gave students an up close and personal encounter with 10 of these phenomenal creatures while learning about the different species, habitats and conservation.

• Mrs. Levesque, AES's School Adjustment Counselor instructed grade 2 and 3 students over a six week time period using Michelle Garcia Winner's *Social Detective*. Her Social Thinking curriculum helps students develop the social skills they need to be successful in school as well as how our behavior affects the feelings and reactions of those around us.




